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Dedication to family and horses a winning combination for Stites

Twenty years ago quality time with his family meant Flint Stites loading his five young sons into his Ford Ranger every Saturday. Joined by his wife Chris, Stites, then a veterinarian, would make his rounds to Virginia's horse farms.

"It was the only way we'd see each other," said Chris, who met Stites on a blind date set up by a friend. "I met him after he started his own practice. He had a difficult time finding associates who didn't want to move on after a year, but he would never turn down a client who had a horse that was ill or injured, and often didn't care what was owed him as long as the horses were okay."

Stites grew up in Kentucky attending prep school and high school before heading to Tennessee where he graduated from the University of Tennessee's College of Veterinary Medicine in 1984. "After graduation I started working at Woodside Equine near Doswell, Virginia," said Stites. "When I went out on my own I'd go for days on end without seeing my family." On the side he usually kept a few horses in training.

Owner Robert Bause, who has owned horses in partnership with Stites for 25 years, met him as he was juggling both training and his veterinary practice. "Soon after I met Flint he told me he felt he wasn't doing justice to either his veterinary practice or his racehorses and decided he'd rather train," said Bause. "At the time Flint was leasing the training track at Meadow Farm in Doswell."

In 1994 Stites made a life-changing decision to give up his equine practice to train racehorses fulltime. Looking for a central location where he'd have access to other Mid-Atlantic tracks and the ability to spend more time with his family, he chose Penn National in Grantville, Pa. His sons and Chris are an integral part of his racing stable

which fills 46 stalls in Barn 5 on the Penn National backstretch.

Together they reached a milestone 1,700 wins on Oct. 9 with Charles McGill's Blissful Miss and finished out the month with five more victories—the last on Oct. 31 with Chris' own first-time starter, Cherokee Cowboy.

"I never thought I'd reach that number," said Stites, who is the fourth leading trainer at the meet and remains among the top 10 every year. "For a long time we would win 90 to 100 races a year but when the slot machine revenue came in and purses increased the competition got a lot tougher." The Stiteses were up to the task, and slots or not, he has accumulated over \$200,000 in breeder and stallion awards the last four years, according to the Pennsylvania Horse Breeders website.

Bause, who is retired from American Tobacco, met Stites outside of Richmond, Va. "I was in the tobacco business most of my life and got transferred to Richmond from Lexington, Kentucky. I had always wanted to get involved in horseracing and at that time all of the big tobacco farms in Kentucky also had racehorses. I learned a lot about horses from owners and breeders out there."

Bause was attending a tobacco sale when he met former Governor Brereton Jones, longtime Thoroughbred breeder and owner of Airdrie Stud. "He advised me that when I was ready, I should find a trainer who was willing to be partners in the horses with me."

In 1991, Virginia held its first pari-mutuel race at Morven Park. With the anticipated opening of Colonial Downs in 1997, Bause saw a chance to get involved in the state's breeding program and purchased two shares of the stallion Fred Astaire,

who stood in Charlottesville. "I was soon looking for a trainer. Flint is a first class guy, runs a great family operation, and his horses and their care have always been a priority. I can't say enough good about him."

When Stites decided to move to Pennsylvania and train from Penn National, Bause was there alongside of him. "I said 'you are my man' and we've been 50-50 partners ever since. I do try to stay in the background—you won't see my name in the program. All I asked is that we run under the name of Wild Card Stable, with blue and red colors since Flint is an old Kentucky boy and I attended the University of Louisville. Blue is for the Kentucky Wildcats and red for the Louisville Cardinals. All Flint asked for was checks on the sleeves of our silks."

Bause recalls the best horse he had with Stites—a filly named Favorite Wish. "She had tailed off a bit so we sent her to the Camptown Races, an annual fair meet in Ashland," he said. "After that Flint put her in a race at Penn. He never told me about entering her, it was kind of a last minute thing and she went off at 51-1. I never had a nickel on her that day and she went on to win a lot of races for us the next four years before she was claimed. We have had a lot of good horses and a lot of fun over the years."

"Beverly and Bob Bause are like family, they've been with us for so long," said Chris, who along with her husband took a rare

weekend away from the track and farm to attend the Breeders' Cup in Lexington with the Bauses.

Owners Stephen G. and Debbie Jackson are also longtime clients and friends of Stites. Their 2-year-old Artie Thriller broke his maiden versus special weight company at Presque Isle Downs on Sept. 7 and is one of the youngsters in the barn that Stites expects will improve.

With the move to Pennsylvania, Stites no longer worried about finding time for his family as his Flint Stites Facebook page accurately describes his racing stable as a family operation, everyone having a hand in their success. Seven days a week Stites, who has been on the board of the HBPA for 12 years, arrives early joining his oldest son and assistant trainer Owen. With about 20 different owners as well as his own homebreds, Stites depends on his sons and his wife to keep things working smoothly. Chris joins her family at 5 a.m., then returns home to her office where she maintains all the billing and files, then spends time with their six grandchildren.

Robert Martin, Chris' son from a previous marriage, is the stable blacksmith and Will, the middle son, does a lot of everything from assistant training (he has his own trainer's license and small stable), galloping, outriding, rubbing horses, foaling mares, shipping and breaking babies. Youngest boys Corey and Taylor are still in college but fill in as hot walkers when they can. "Taylor has just two semesters

left and Corey attends college full time," said Chris. "They are both into computers and Taylor has already declared there will be no horse business for him," she said. "Although they do seem to forget that the horses have paid their way through school, I don't mind at all that they won't follow their brothers into the business. It is very difficult with its ups and downs."

"From the beginning the boys have understood that there is no free lunch for anyone," said Stites. "Everyone has something they have to do. We have all been working together for a long time and even though we are family, the boys understand what their responsibilities are, who is the boss and who is next in command."

Stites' father Bill, a former farm manager in Paris, Ky., worked for his son when the family first moved to Pennsylvania. He now serves on the backstretch as president of Penn National's Racetrack Chaplaincy, living just down the road from the family. Penn National is a 10-minute commute from their leased 50-acre Whirlwind Farm in Grantville, which Stites says is a "no frill working farm." A training barn to break babies and house older horses who don't tolerate the track atmosphere live in one barn while the broodmares share another.

Astride his stable pony, Stites watches his runners train six days a week. "We send out sets of horses as soon as the track opens and don't stop until 11 a.m. when it closes. Then it is back to the barn to check all of them. We are

here every day although we schedule Sunday as a day with just walkers. It gives everyone a little break."

He credits his help with much of his success, in addition to his sons, exercise riders Angel Gelpi, a former rider from Puerto Rico who has been working with Stites for 15 years, and Tommy Lanzalotti, who has been with him for five years.

Whirlwind Farm is also home to stallions Aisle, a 1999 son of Pulpit, and newcomer Golddigger's Boy, a multiple stakes-winning PA-Bred by Jump Start. Bred and owned by Frances and William Hartwell and trained by

Ramon Preciado, Golddigger's Boy won eight of 27 starts and \$585,985, while racing until he was 6. Currently owned by Baywood Farm, he covered four mares this past breeding season and will stand his first full season in 2016. "Aisle is getting up there in age and like most offspring of Pulpit has a little bit of an edge to him. He can be a little tough to handle," said Stites. "We currently have a couple of his foals out here who have done very well at Penn National."

"Aisle will always have a home with us," said Chris. "He has been here with us through thick and thin," she said. "He got us started in

this end of the business and has sired some real runners. He was meant to be a Derby horse when Claiborne owned him but was injured before he broke his maiden. He was such a hard runner with a big heart that he would have hurt himself if we continued to race him."

In times where most families don't even sit down to dinner together, Flint and Chris Stites have successfully put their family first while excelling in the demanding industry of breeding and racing Thoroughbreds. Next milestone: a winner's circle full of extended family and many longtime owners for win number 2,000.
