Al's Gal: First Pennsylvania, Then the World

Every breeder wishes that the very first foal they produce will go on to become a Grade 1 winner. It is a pipe dream, often shrouded in the logic that the odds of such a feat are astronomical. But for Alex Malone, the impossible dream became an “amazing” reality, as the first foal she ever bred is Al's Gal.

In early 2009, Kennett Square resident Malone started a racing partnership, which later became a single-member limited liability company focused on breeding rather than racing. She'd been working in banking, far removed from the Sport of Kings, but became enamored with the game. “In 2010 I decided to get serious,” she said. “I thought that if I was going to be serious about breeding I needed to start going to the sales.”

Malone attended the 2010 Keeneland November Breeding Stock sale, where she fell in love with two mares already in foal. Both of them failed to meet their reserves, with the first being a Gone West mare in foal to Stephen Got Even. The second, Dans La Ville (Chi), really drew Malone's attention.

The daughter of the stakes-placed stallion Winning is out of the Chilean mare Syracuse, who had produced two group stakes winners and was the second dam of Pennsylvania Derby hero Grand Hombre. Dans La Ville won only once on the track, but Malone had a reason to follow her closely.

“She was in foal to English Channel, who was standing at Lane's End at the time,” Malone recalled. The Farish family, who Malone already knew from her college days, own Lane's End Farm in Kentucky. “I decided to buy her privately,” Malone said. “I would never have done that if I hadn't gone to school with the Farishes.”

Malone knew the mare had been bred on a late cover and would not foal until May. Right on cue, Dans La Ville produced a bay filly May 7, 2011, the first foal born in Malone's name. “From the time she came out, we knew she was special,” Malone said. “This was our first baby girl that we bred, and talk about beginner's luck.”

Shortly thereafter, the Paramount Sales company approached Malone to discuss the possibility of selling the filly. The foal's full sister, Ann of the Dance, won her first two starts that summer, and eventually would go on to be a stakes winner and graded stakes placed. "Paramount said I had something special," Malone recalled, "so I had to decide between taking the chance on racing her or just selling her."

The Pennsylvania-bred filly went through the sales ring three times. She sold as a weanling at the Fasig Tipton November sale for \$50,000 to John Greathouse Bloodstock. The next fall, she brought a paltry \$30,000 from Phase II Thoroughbreds at the Keeneland September Yearling Sale. Wheeled back in the Keeneland April Two Year Olds Sale, the filly that would be named Al's Gal brought \$40,000 to agent Gary Contessa on behalf of a partnership that included John Moirano, Mark Valentine, Sean Shay and Pine Stables.

Al's Gal got off to an inauspicious start, finishing 10th in a 2-year-old maiden race at Saratoga going $1\frac{1}{16}$ miles on the turf. Even though she trailed the field, she finished only eight lengths off the winner in a tight finish. She returned as a 3-year-old to finish second for a \$65,000 claiming tag, beaten three-quarters of a length. Returned to New York for her third start, an Aqueduct maiden special weight event, Al's Gal won by a neck at 9-1 odds.

Two starts later, Al's Gal was back in for a tag, this time at the \$40,000 level. She was claimed by trainer Burce Levine for Old Light-house Stables in June 2014, and promptly won for them at Saratoga next out. The $6\frac{1}{2}$ -length victory drew the eyes of rival trainers; next

out, Al's Gal was claimed for \$50,000 by Bruce Brown for the Champion Equine LLC. Al's Gal toiled in the claiming ranks through half of 2015, winning at the \$35,000 level and being claimed one final time for that price by Mike Maker for Ken and Sarah Ramsey.

Under the new regime, Al's Gal flourished. She won a Churchill Downs allowance race by $3\frac{1}{2}$ lengths, then finished second by a nose in the \$100,000 Mrs. Penny Stakes in her native Pennsylvania.

This year, Al's Gal has blossomed into one of the nation's best older fillies and mares on grass. She won the \$65,000 Keertana

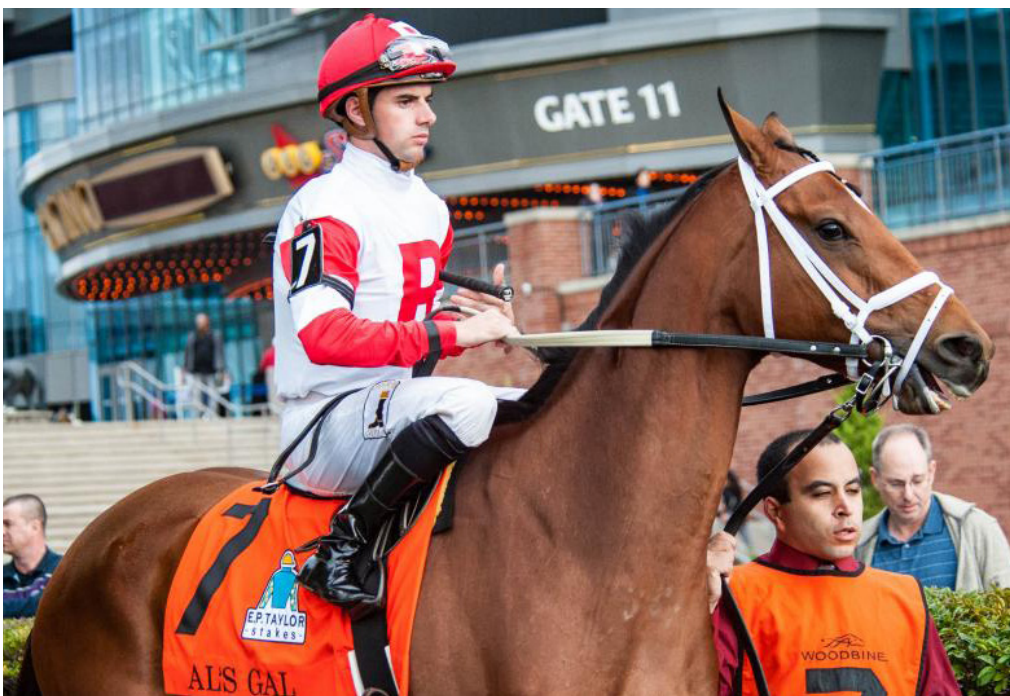
Stakes at Churchill to secure her first stakes victory, then finished second by a half-length at 20-1 odds in the \$700,000 Beverly D. Stakes-G1 at Arlington Park. That effort sent her to Kentucky Downs as the favorite in the \$350,000 Kentucky Downs Ladies Marathon Stakes, which she won by a length and a half in a driving finish.

The crowning jewel of Al's Gal's season has been the \$500,000 E.P. Taylor Stakes-G1 at Woodbine Racecourse in Canada. Al's Gal faced some of the world's best grass mares from both the United States, Canada, and abroad, and defeated them all by a thrilling nose. That effort earned Al's Gal a trip to the Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Turf-G1, where she finished ninth of 13 runners with a rough trip in the stretch. Al's Gal's record stands at eight wins, eight seconds and three thirds in 27 starts for earnings of \$750,120.

Although Malone had no say in the naming of the filly, she is quick to point out that her own nickname is "Al." "I'm happy for the Ramseys," she said, "but I am kicking myself. I do still have the mare and I'm thinking of going back to English Channel."

The storybook ride has been one Malone cherishes. "What does every breeder want? Here I was just in banking and dreaming of breeding a Kentucky Derby winner, but to have your first one go on to run in the Breeders' Cup? I couldn't be more pleased. She's something everyone dreams up. She's unreal."

Al's Gal sold once more on Nov. 7, bringing \$800,000 during the Fasig Tipton November Sale. She was purchased by SF Bloodstock and Newgate Farm, an Australian outfit that said they are, "thrilled to add this Grade 1 winner to our broodmare band!" From Pennsylvania to Canada and now down under, Al's Gal has truly evolved into a world-class mare. ■



Breeders' Cup winner Finest City joins elite group

Finest City, winner of this year's \$1-million Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Sprint-G1, joined an elite group of PA-Breds to be draped with the purple and gold Breeders' Cup flower garland, joining 1996 Classic winner Alphabet Soup, 1994 Turf winner Tikkanen and 1989 Juvenile Fillies winner Go for Wand.

The 4-year-old filly owned by Seltzer Thoroughbreds and trained by Ian Kruljac was a neck off an opening quarter of :21.98 and never worse than third in the field of 13 before Mike Smith sent her to the lead in upper stretch. The daughter of City Zip drove home to win by three-quarters of a length in 1:22.37 over defending Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Sprint champion Wavell Avenue. Bred by Hank Nothhaft's HnR Nothhaft Horseracing LLC out of the Lemon Drop Kid mare Be Envied, and foaled at Northview PA in Peach Bottom, Finest City earned \$550,000 to boost her career total to \$925,594 from 14 starts.

House Bill 2303 Passes: Fund Awards Back On Track

What started as an unintended change in the language of Act 7 quickly snowballed into a nightmare for Pennsylvania Breeders—a nightmare that lasted eight months, but is finally coming to a close with the Governor signing House Bill 2303. Although the process of signing the Bill into law was relatively painless for HB 2303, the same cannot be said for the legislative battles that took place since February.

In May 2016, House Bill 923 was referred to the Agricultural Committee in the House of Representatives, but went nowhere from there. Then Senate Bill 1229 was created and endured a number of reviews from both the House, Senate, and the Agricultural Committee but an end result could not be agreed upon. The State of Pennsylvania then entered a legislative recess, which hit breeders even harder.

In July, PHBA President Roger Legg wrote a moving letter to Governor Wolf urging for payments to be released under the then-current wording, but unfortunately his hands were tied. The next month Pennsylvania Breeders showed up at the Racing Commission meeting in an

impressive turnout, but again the efforts were met with legal barriers.

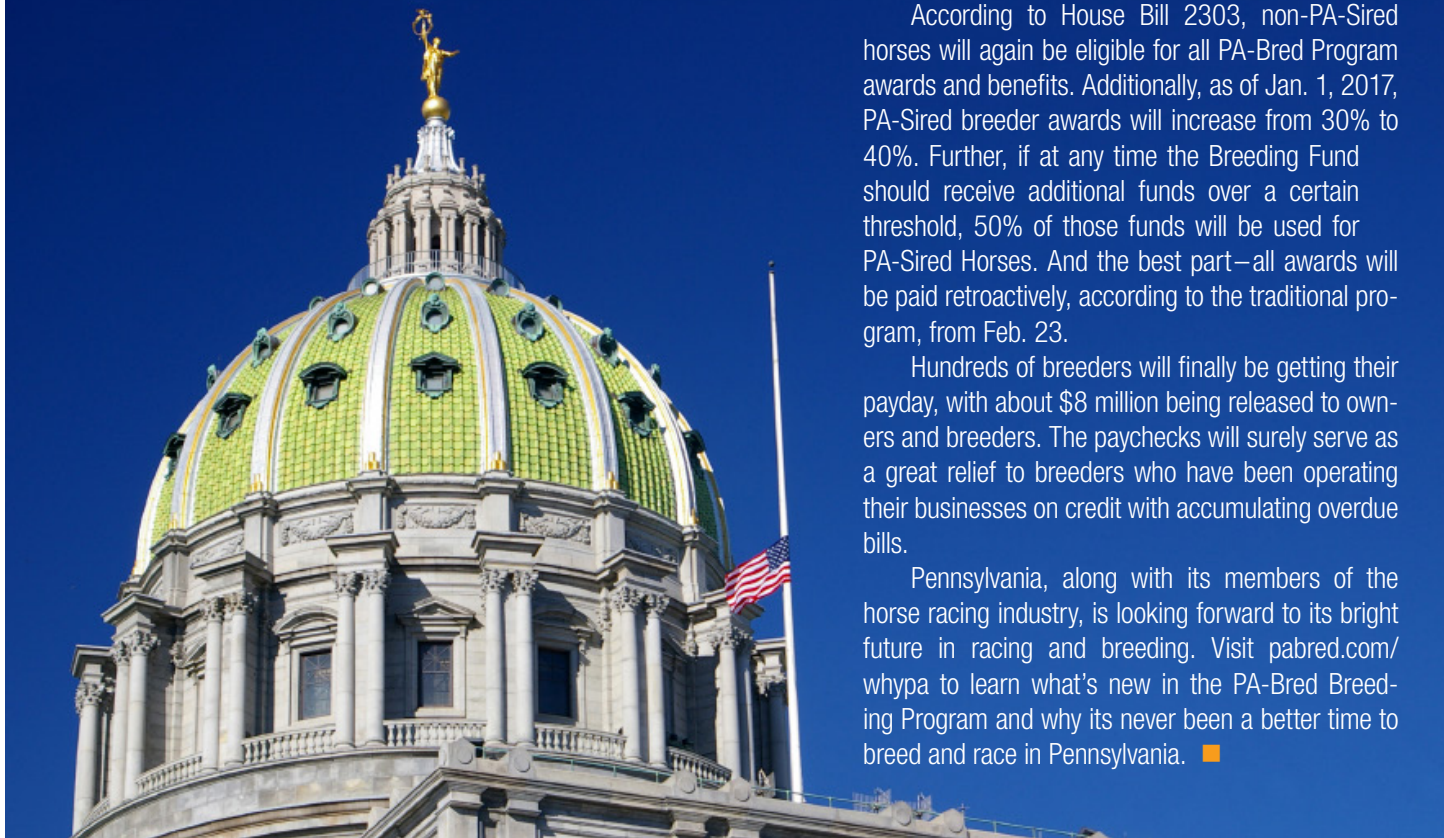
Finally, on Sept. 28 an amendment to correct the wording was agreed to and unanimously passed 180-0 in the House—an amendment that became part of House Bill 2303. It again passed unanimously for a final vote in the House on Oct. 17 with a vote of 192-0. After passing the Senate Agricultural Committee, things hit a snag. The Bill was scheduled for a vote on Oct. 26 but was scheduled to be held over without notice; however if the Bill wasn't put to a vote on that very day, it wouldn't see the Senate floor until 2017.

The response from the Pennsylvania Breeders was amazing and overwhelming. Everyone pooled together and gave 110% in contacting their Senate representatives to urge them to bring House Bill 2303 to the floor for a vote. In a miraculous display of democracy at work, the Bill was voted on and passed 47-0 late in the evening on Oct. 26. On Oct. 28 the Bill was signed into law by Governor Wolf.

According to House Bill 2303, non-PA-Sired horses will again be eligible for all PA-Bred Program awards and benefits. Additionally, as of Jan. 1, 2017, PA-Sired breeder awards will increase from 30% to 40%. Further, if at any time the Breeding Fund should receive additional funds over a certain threshold, 50% of those funds will be used for PA-Sired Horses. And the best part—all awards will be paid retroactively, according to the traditional program, from Feb. 23.

Hundreds of breeders will finally be getting their payday, with about \$8 million being released to owners and breeders. The paychecks will surely serve as a great relief to breeders who have been operating their businesses on credit with accumulating overdue bills.

PA Stallion News Briefs

FRESHMAN FIRST FOR UPTOWNCHARLYBROWN

Like father, like daughter: Uptowncharlybrown won his first start at 2, and so did the filly True Sweetheart, and she did it spectacularly, rolling home a 10-length winner at Parx Racing on Nov. 8. A member of Uptowncharlybrown's first crop of seven foals, she is his first winner.

Bred and owned by Fantasy Lane Stable and trained by Ed Coletti, True Sweetheart (out of the Malibu Moon mare Moonlight Serenade) led at every call and extended her margin over her 10 rivals in the six-furlong maiden test.

Fantasy Lane also campaigned Uptowncharlybrown and retired him to stud in Pennsylvania in 2013. The 9-year-old son of Limehouse stands at Diamond B Farm in Mohrsville, Pa., for \$1,500 with a special incentive—the fee is payable when the foal wins.

After winning his only start at 2, Uptowncharlybrown won his first start at 3, the 7-furlong Pasco Stakes at Tampa Bay Downs,

in January. When he finished third behind Rule in Tampa's Sam F. Davis-G3 he was officially on the Triple Crown trail. That April he rallied for third in Keeneland's Grade 2 Lexington Stakes. He made the Belmont Stakes-G1 and finished fifth, less than four lengths behind the winning Drosselmeyer, but was disqualified when a lead weight pad fell out of the saddle during the running.

He missed nearly a year due to a soft tissue injury, and returned to race until early in his 5-year-old season. During his career he had competed on dirt, turf and synthetic with two wins, two seconds and two thirds from 13 starts, and earnings of \$125,030.

Out of Langfuhr's winning daughter La Iluminada, the dam of six winners from as many starters, Uptowncharlybrown is a half-brother to \$218,280-earner Startjumpsin Marnie, a stakes winner on dirt and turf. ■

XANTHUS FARMS ROSTER UPDATES

Ronald and Barbara Rickline have added Taken by the Storm, a son of leading sire Stormy Atlantic from the family of Horse of the Year and leading sire A.P. Indy, and Grade 1 winner Swagger Jack to their Xanthus Farms in Gettysburg for the 2017 season.

A multiple allowance winner of \$148,801, 6-year-old Taken by the Storm stands his first season for \$1,500 live foal, with special consideration to approved mares and mares foaling in Pennsylvania.

Swagger Jack, the 8-year-old partnership-owned stallion who stood last season at Dana Point Farm in Lenhartsville, Pa., stands for private contract.

Taken by the Storm was a winner on the turf at Gulfstream Park going one mile, and won twice at a mile and a sixteenth, at Keeneland and on Turfway Park's synthetic surface. Out of Paint Brush (by Broad Brush) the bay stallion descends from major producer Lassie Dear, a graded stakes-winning daughter of Buckpasser who produced 12 winner from 12 starters, including stakes winners and sires Wolfhound (highweighted sprinter at 4 in England), Foxhound and Spectacular Spy, Group 1-placed Al Mufti (also a sire), stakes-placed Lassie's Lady, champion sire Deerhound, and the most influential of them all, the Secretariat filly Weekend Surprise. A graded stakes winner of \$402,892 and broodmare of the year, Weekend Surprise produced classic winners A.P. Indy and Summer Squall as well as stakes winners Eavesdropper—sire of Page McKenney—and Welcome Sur-

prise and stakes-placed Honor Grades, a Grade/Group 1 sire. The family includes such luminaries as European champions Duke of Marmalade (Ire) and Ruler of the World (Ire), classic winner Lemon Drop Kid and Breeders' Cup Mile-G1 winner Court Vision.

A who's who pedigree, Taken by the Storm's second dam is the Unbridled mare Unbridled Lassie, whose three stakes-placings including the Grade 1 Coaching Club American Oaks. His third dam Lassie Connection was a product of Triple Crown champion Seattle Slew and Lassie Dear. She produced stakes winner Winning Connection and three graded stakes-placed runners as well as the dam of graded winner Fortuitous.

Swagger Jack, the only son of champion sire Smart Strike standing in the region, won the seven-furlong Grade 1 Carter Handicap and four other races from 18 starts, was twice graded stakes-placed and earned \$460,519. The dark bay bred by Edward P. Evans, is a half-brother to graded winner and stakes-producer Tap Dance, stakes winner Grand Prayer, the dam of millionaire Valid, and to three stakes-placed runners, including Lyrical Ghost, dam of Silverside, a four-time champion in Spain and highweighted older horse at 5 to 7 furlongs in Germany.

Swagger Jack stood his first season in Kentucky in 2014 and moved to Indiana for 2015. His first foals will get to the races in 2017. ■

PA-BREDS BRING BIG PRICES AT KENTUCKY FALL SALES

Classy Pennsylvania-breds appeared in the catalogues of the Kentucky fall sales held in November, and big prices were the result. First up was Fasig-Tipton Kentucky's The November Sale on Nov. 7, with four selling, each for six figures. A total of 52 were sold at Keeneland's massive November sale that ran from Nov. 8-20.

The top price of all sold came at Keeneland, when Brushwood Stable's PA-Bred weanling Tapit filly was purchased for \$975,000 by White Birch Farm. By the nation's leading sire, the gray/roan January foal is out of the Empire Maker mare Miss Empire, a stakes-winning and Grade 1-placed juvenile who is a half-sister to Grade 1-winning sprinter Bordonaro.

Three mares sold at the Fasig-Tipton sale for \$800,000 or more, led by 2016 Grade 1 winner Illuminant (pictured right) for a \$900,000 final bid by SF Bloodstock LLC. The daughter of Quality Road, who hadn't started since capturing the Gamely Stakes-G1 at Santa Anita in May after finishing third in the Grade 1 Jenny Wiley at Keeneland in April for Eclipse Thoroughbred Partners, was offered by Bluewater Sales LLC Agent X. The dark bay 4-year-old out of stakes winner Sparkling Number (by Polish Numbers) was bred by Sycamore Hall



Farm LLC. She sold as a yearling for \$32,000 at Keeneland, and as a 2-year-old at the March Ocala sale for \$180,000.

Selling for \$800,000 were two more 2016 stakes winners: Al's Gal and Spelling Again.

Offered by Taylor Made Sales Agency Agent XVI, the 5-year-old English Channel mare Al's Gal had run in the Breeders' Cup Filly and

Mare Turf-G1 two days earlier, and in her start prior to that had won the Grade 1 E.P. Taylor Stakes at Woodbine. A full sister to Ann of the Dance and half to May Be Now, both stakes winners, out of a sister to Chilean champion turf mare Santana (Chi) and from the family of Pennsylvania Derby winner Grand Hombre, Al's Gal was purchased by SF Bloodstock and New Gate Farm. Bred by Malone Racing LLC, she initially sold as a weanling for \$50,000.

Spelling Again (below right), a multiple graded winner who also competed in the Breeders' Cup, in the Filly and Mare Sprint-G1, and earlier in the year won the Princess Rooney Stakes-G2, was consigned

by Taylor Made Sales Agency Agent for Seajay Racing LLC, who campaigned her since she was claimed for \$40,000 at Santa Anita in May 2015. The buyer was China Horse Club International. The 5-year-old daughter of Awesome Again—Spelling, by Alphabet Soup was bred by George Strawbridge and is a half-sister to PA-bred stakes winner Sky Willow.

Of the 56 PA-breds sold at the two sales, 15 brought six-figures. Also going for a half-million or more were the Brushwood Farm offerings of Wile Cat and her Tapit filly, who sold back-to-back at Keeneland for \$600,000 and \$500,000, respectively.

Wile Cat, an unraced daughter of Storm Cat and Grade 1 winner Strategic Maneuver (by Cryptoclearance) also bred in Pennsylvania by Brushwood Stable, sold in foal to American Pharoah. The dam of five foals of racing age, her first foal is group winner and Breeders' Cup Juvenile Sprint runner-up Shumoos. The mare, a full sister to Grade 2 winner Cat Fighter and a half-sister to Group 3 winner Ishiguru, produced fillies the past three years by Tapit. Consigned through Eaton Sales, Wile Cat was purchased by Springhouse Farm, while her daughter sold to Jumping Jack Racing LLC. ■

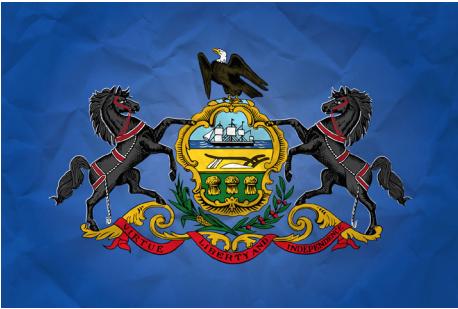

PA-Bred Stakes Recap at Parx Racing



Blue Mountain Juvenile Fillies

Rodman W. Moorhead III's homebred filly Rose Tree followed an impressive debut at Delaware Park in October with an equally impressive showing in her next start, the Blue Mountain Juvenile Fillies at Penn National on Nov. 23.

The filly from the last crop of Harlan's Holiday, trained by Jonathan Sheppard, went off as second choice in the field nine state-bred fillies, bided her time while stalking the pace, swung four wide around the far turn, then powered home to win by three and three-quarter lengths over lanthe. It was another five lengths back to Peach Alley in third. Time for the six furlongs over a fast track was 1:11.24.

The bay filly rolled to a 9¼-length score in a six-furlong maiden special weight at Delaware on Oct. 15. Both wins came with Andrew Wolfson up.

Rose Tree was purchased in utero when Sheppard signed the ticket for her winning dam Amusing (by Distorted Humor and a half-sister to champion sprinter Lost In the Fog) from the Claiborne Farm consignment at the Keeneland January Horses of All Ages sale in 2014. The price was \$280,000. The mare has since produced for the Moorheads (Rodman and his wife Alice) an Animal Kingdom colt in 2015, named Magical Kingdom, and a colt by Hard Spun this year. The mare was bred back to Elusive Quality. ■

Blasts From The Past

LYPHARD

1961, by Northern Dancer—Goofed, by *Court Martial. Bred by Mrs. J.O. Burgwin; owned by Madame Pierre Wertheimer; trained by Alec Head. Foaled at Barberry Farm, Sewickley, Pa.

Small in stature, but boasting an immense personality and presence, Lyphard was a near carbon copy of his illustrious sire Northern Dancer and became one of his best sons at stud.

Foaled at Mrs J.O. Burgwin's Barberry Farm near Sewickley, out of the stakes-winning Court Martial mare Goofed, Lyphard was sold as a weanling in 1969 at Keeneland by Mrs. Burgwin for \$35,000. He brought 15,000 guineas at Newmarket, the great French trainer and breeder Alec Head making the purchase for Madame Pierre Wertheimer. It was noted that Lyphard had not grown much as a yearling and was overlooked because of his size, but Head was interested in him because he had trained the colt's granddam, Barra.

Racing in France, he became one of that country's leading milers—winning the Prix Jacques Le Marois and Prix de la Foret at Longchamp—and retired after winning six of 12 starts at 2 and 3, five of his wins in stakes.

Lyphard entered stud in France and within five years was the leading sire (he topped the list twice, in 1978 and 1979).

Interest in the stocky bay blaze-faced stallion skyrocketed and Lyphard was back in the U.S. by 1978 to stand at Gainesway Farm in Kentucky, syndicated for nearly \$1 million per share. He was the leading sire in North America in 1986, sired 115 stakes winners and more than a dozen champions, led by 1986 U.S. grass champion Manila and Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe winners Three Troikas and Dancing Brave.

Lyphard enjoyed a long life at Gainesway. Pensioned in 1996 at age 27, he lived nine more years, and at the time of his death at 36 in 2005, was one of the oldest horses in the world. ■

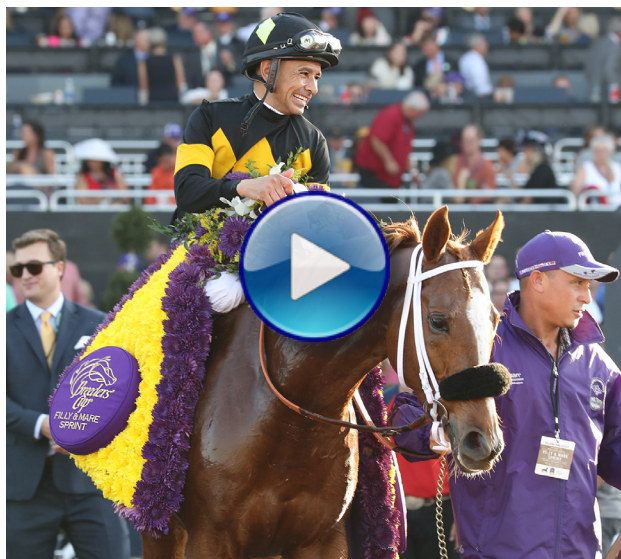

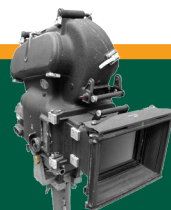
