PA-Breds Eye Breeders' Cup Championship

Three Pennsylvania-breds are taking their credentials into the 34th Breeders' Cup, to be run at the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club Nov. 3 and 4. Defending champion Finest City will hook the brilliant Unique Bella in the Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Sprint-G1, while Mor Spirit will attempt to fire off a five-month layoff in the Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile-G1.

Finest City became just the fourth Breeders' Cup winner to be bred in Pennsylvania, following Go for Wand in the 1989 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies, Tikkanen in the 1994 Breeders' Cup Turf, and Alphabet Soup in the 1996 Breeders' Cup Classic, one of the great upsets in Breeders' Cup history. Finest City would be the first since Groupie Doll in 2012-2013 to duplicate a win in the Filly and Mare Sprint.

Standing in her way is Unique Bella, a leggy daughter of Tapit and Breeders' Cup Distaff heroine Unrivaled Belle, by Unbridled's Song. Bred by Elizabeth Moran's Brushwood Stable, Unique Bella was sold for \$400,000 to Don Alberto, who turned her over to conditioner Jerry Hollendorfer.

The imposing gray broke her maiden by 10¼ lengths over the Del Mar surface last year on a wet November day, and has since made it five in a row. Injury kept her from the Santa Anita Oaks-G1 and Kentucky Oaks-G1 this spring, but after a seven-month lay-off, Unique Bella returned sprinting against older mares to win the L.A. Woman Stakes-G3 in her prep for the Breeders' Cup.

"She had a nice work on Wednesday in :59.20. We are just about ready to go," said Hollendorfer. While the injury and subsequent lengthy layoff derailed her spring campaign, it isn't concerning the conditioner now. "She's come back real well and has been doing well since then," he said. "We're very pleased with how she's been doing since she returned."



Unrivaled Belle, who earned over \$1.8 million on the track with four stakes wins, produced a weanling full sister to Unique Bella this spring for new owner Mandy Pope, who bought her for \$3.8 million at the 2016 Keeneland November Sale. The weanling's name is Unrivaled Princess.

Breeder Hank Nothhaft, who bred Finest City but sold her for \$50,000 as a weanling, is eagerly anticipating the match with Unique Bella. "My thoughts going into the Breeders' Cup center around the irony that Pennsylvania breeders could produce two fillies/mares the quality of Unique Bella and Finest City two years apart," he said. "What are the odds? Also, if Unique Bella had a

campaign unaffected by a minor injury, she would almost certainly be running in the Distaff, allowing the two PA-breds to avoid a head to head match-up."

Young trainer lan Kruljac, who was just 28 when Finest City won the 2016 Filly and Mare Sprint as an 8-1 shot, has been conservative with the daughter of City Zip—Be Envied, by Lemon Drop Kid, this year. Finest City won the Santa Monica Stakes-G2 in January, then ran second or third in three consecutive Grade 1 races between seven furlongs and 11/8 miles. She has not started since July 8, but has been working steadily since her freshening. She has not been worse than third in 15 months, and has earned \$1,256,394 for her owners Tyler and Wayne Seltzer of Seltzer Thoroughbreds.

"I can only imagine how I will feel if Finest City wins again," Nothhaft said. "We still have such positive feelings about last year's win. With the great year we had developing her half-sister, [stakes winner] Grand Prix... another win by Finest City would be an intense emotional high and a strong verification of our strategy and management of our stable."

The \$1 million Filly and Mare Sprint, contested over 7 furlongs, will be the third Breeders' Cup event on Saturday with a post time of 4:14 p.m. Eastern.

Mor Spirit will start in the \$1 million Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile-G1, slated as the second Breeders' Cup race on Friday with a post time of 6:05 p.m. Eastern. He faces a tough group including his stable-mate, Gold Cup at Santa Anita winner Cupid, as well as San Diego

At 3, the son of Eskendereya won the Robert B. Lewis Stakes-G3 and was second in a sloppy edition of the Santa Anita Derby-G1 before running 10th in the Kentucky Derby-G1. This year, Mor Spirit has raced lightly but has traveled all over, running second in the San Antonio Stakes-G2 at Santa Anita before winning Oaklawn's Essex Handicap, Lone Star's Steve Sexton Mile Stakes-G3, and the Met Mile in succession. Mor Spirit has not raced since June 10.

The Man On a Streak

With an eye-popping performance in the \$100,000 Banjo Picker Sprint Stakes at Parx Racing Sept. 2, The Man extended his winning streak to seven and demonstrated that he is one of the fastest Pennsylvania-breds in training.

Co-owned by Natalie J. Baffert (wife of Hall of Fame trainer Bob Baffert) and Bernard C. Schiappa, and conditioned by John Servis, The Man has done little wrong since breaking his maiden by nearly five lengths at Santa Anita in March 2015.

In the Banjo Picker, one of five stakes on the Pennsylvania's Day at the Races card at the Bensalem oval, The Man was pounded down to heavy favoritism over three rivals, including PJG Stable's

Favorite Tale, a multiple graded stakes winner, third in the Grade 1 Breeders' Cup Sprint in 2015, and earner of nearly \$1 million.

At the break, Favorite Tale went to the front under Frankie Pennington, but was immediately confronted by The Man and jockey Jorge Vargas Jr., who came up to his throatlatch on the outside. Favorite Tale held a slim advantage through the first quarter-mile, but the pair then engaged in an intense dingdong duel from that point to the wire, clicking off fractions of :22.50, :44.69 and :56.72.

Down the stretch they rumbled, with neither horse giving an inch. They hit the wire as a team, with The Man poking his head in front when it counted most, timed in a swift 1:09.47 for the 6 furlongs.

The winner's share of \$75,000 boosted The Man's total earnings to \$293,750, and the victory was his seventh from 10 starts. This year, he's been a perfect six-for-six.

A 5-year-old son of former Pennsylvania stallion Ecclesiastic, The Man was bred by Glenn Brok, who owns Diamond B Farm in Mohrsville, Pa., with his wife, Becky. He was offered as a yearling at the farm's annual open house, but there were no takers, so Brok entered him in the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern Fall yearling sale, where he was RNA at \$17,000.

Bloodstock agent Rod McVey then told Brok he needed a few colts to fill an order for a client, and asked he had any. Brok told him about The Man, and ended up partnering 50-50 with him. McVey sent him to Ocala to be broken, and then a few months went by, with McVey reporting that he was doing well and that his father had been clocking him, and liked him very much.

It was decided to enter him in the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic May 2-year-olds in training sale at Timonium, where he got lots of attention from prospective buyers with an impressive breeze.

"The day he worked the wind was blowing something fierce and the track was slow, but he went down there in 10 and change," said Brok, who said that after the breeze he received plenty of congratulatory back-slaps from friends.

A noted bloodstock agent told Brok that he'd done a stride analysis of The Man and found he had the biggest stride of any horse at the sale.

When the hammer dropped, the colt that Brok couldn't sell as a yearling brought a \$115,000 bid from Bob Baffert, with New York-based trainer Gary Contessa as the underbidder.

"Bob liked what he saw, and all credit goes to him for picking him out for us at the sale," said co-owner Schiappa, a longtime client of Baffert's. Among the horses that Schiappa has co-owned is Game On Dude, a popular Grade 1 winner and earner of more than \$6.4 million during his 34-start career.

Shipped to California, The Man began his career at Santa Anita Jan. 3, 2015, for Baffert and broke his maiden in his fourth start. Soon after, he was sent to the sidelines, gelded, and shipped East to the barn of John Servis, where it was decided to take advantage of the Pennsylvania-bred program.

"Being a Pennsylvania-bred, Baffert told me he wanted the horse to make some money," recalled Servis, who said The Man had chipped a knee but was making steady progress towards a return to the races. "He had a good bottom already, and I worked him five or six times and then wanted to make it as easy for him as possible for his comeback."

After nearly a two-year layoff, The Man returned Feb. 15 in a Pennsylvania-bred "a-other than" allowance race at Penn National. He showed he was ready to go, as he seized control right out of the gate, set fractions of :46.19 and :58.48 under Vargas while increasing his advantage, and then breezed under the wire four lengths in front "under a hand ride," according to the Equibase chart.

A month later, The Man came back in an open allowance at Parx Racing, a 5½-furlong test that carried a purse of \$47,000. Installed as the heavy favorite, The Man made quick work of his six foes, winning by nearly three lengths.

Three more allowance victories at Parx followed - a ninelength blowout against Pennsylvania-breds April 23, a gritty length tally against open company May 20, in which he overcame a stumbling start, and a two-length score against open foes Aug. 1, a dominant performance in 1:09.80 that saw him "being throttled down in deep stretch" by jockey Vargas, according to the chart. The gelding then won the Banjo Picker a month later.

"He's an exciting horse – he's so fast," said Schiappa. "John [Servis] has done a super job with him, and the Pennsylvania-bred program is fabulous. He's the first Pennsylvania-bred I've owned, and we've made a lot of money. The purse structure is great, and so is the owner's bonus. I'm very thankful that we sent The Man to Pennsylvania."

The Man is out of the Northern Afleet mare Shorty's Epiphany, who was also bred by Brok. She is a half-sister to multiple stakes winner Rodeo Licious (\$206,670); her dam, Shorty's Promise, was one of the first mares bought by the Broks when they started their farm.

Grand Prix's Road To Success

Hank Nothhaft tried to sell Grand Prix not once, but twice.

It seems serendipitous that after failing to meet her reserves in the auction ring, Grand Prix stayed home and has since become a dual stakes winner for Nothhaft, who is more than happy to have her. "She's a super dependable filly that is right up there in my heart," he said. "I'm so lucky to have a horse like that."

The tale of how Grand Prix went from an auction buy back to one of the most valuable mares in Pennsylvania runs through Nothhaft, his bloodstock advisor Carl McEntee, and a champion named Finest City. Nothhaft and McEntee were on a mission to build a solid broodmare band when they came across the Lemon Drop Kid mare Be Envied.

"When we purchased the mare we were buying several mares to support the newly acquired stallion Silver Train," McEntee said. Nothhaft stood Silver Train until his untimely death in 2013. "We had established a budget of \$30,000-\$50,000 per mare, as to pay more would be unwise given the potential return." One mare that stood out was Be Envied. The multiple stakes placed mare, a half-sister to Grade 1-winner Burning Roma, was in foal to consistent sire City Zip. Nothhaft only had to go to \$37,000 to acquire her, with the resulting foal selling for \$50,000 as a weanling. That weanling would one day be known as Finest City, the Eclipse Award Champion Female Sprinter and Pennsylvania Horse of the Year of 2016.

With Finest City not reaching her best stride until she turned four, Be Envied was resold. Nothhaft kept two more of her daughters: Move, by Silver Train, and the other being Grand Prix.

Tale of the Cat was chosen as Grand Prix's sire, a mating based on physical appearance. "The cross was very good and the body types worked together," McEntee said. "It's not all paper as you must choose physicals also."

"We wanted to pump some speed into the foal," Nothhaft added. "We got a tremendous-looking, athletic foal, and decided she was commercial. I sent her through the ring at Keeneland November

as a weanling, but I wasn't going to sell her for less than I thought she was worth. Her bidding stopped at \$62,000 and my reserve was slightly higher than that. I have enough flexibility in my business that I can stick to my principles and be stubborn when I want."

Stubborn enough that when Grand Prix went back through the ring as a yearling with a reserve of \$150,000 and only brought a bid of \$145,000, Nothhaft decided to keep her. "In some ways I was disappointed, but in other ways I had mixed emotions about selling her in the first place," Nothhaft said. "I immediately took her off the grounds and back to Darby Dan. Some people came by trying to make a deal, but I named her a day or two later with a fantastic name and was emotionally committed."

Nothhaft immediately set about following through with big plans for Grand Prix. The bay filly went to Webb Carroll's training center in South Carolina, then went off to the barn of Gary Mandella, who trained Nothhaft's standout mare Living The Life (Ire). "Gary is not known for bringing massive numbers of two year olds to the track," Nothhaft said. "He takes his time getting them prepared."

Under the banner of HnR Nothhaft Horse Racing, Grand Prix debuted at Santa Anita with a third place finish June 9, 2016. That Mandella thought highly enough of her to debut her so quickly signaled to Nothhaft that Grand Prix was precocious and talented, but it took the filly four tries to break her maiden. That win came at Golden Gate Fields in November, demolishing her rivals by five lengths. She was second in the Golden Gate Debutante Stakes to round out her juvenile season.

At 3, Grand Prix ran consistently in allowance company, but it wasn't until she shipped from California to Pennsylvania that she broke through in a big way. "We had great confidence in the horse and trainer, and Finest City had emerged as a phenomenal horse at this point. In the back of our minds, we always remembered that she's a Pennsylvania-bred."

Grand Prix had been training in Pennsylvania for less than two weeks when she won the fittingly named New Start Stakes at Penn National over the well regarded juvenile state champion Rose Tree. "I was confident enough that I flew out for the race," said Nothhaft, who regularly resides in Saratoga, Calif. "She didn't disappoint anybody that day."

From there, Nothhaft tried to "pick races that made sense for her and maximize the potential of the Pennsylvania-bred program." Grand Prix was second in an allowance, then won at the same level a month later, scoring by a neck. She added the Dr. Teresa Garofalo Memorial Stakes at Parx in September, and has since wrapped up her season and will get a break before returning in 2018. She has earned \$211,762 with four wins, four seconds, and three thirds in 14 starts.

Nothhaft didn't throw out the option of sprinting down the hillside turf course at Santa Anita next year, but his ultimate goal would be the Presque Isle Downs Masters Stakes-G2 in September, a race he won in 2014 and 2015 with Living the Life.

"I would love to win that race with a Pennsylvania-bred," he said. "It would be sweet for everyone involved in Pennsylvania."

Nothhaft's classy broodmare band, which includes stakes winners such as Kindle and Living the Life, both in foal to Pioneerof the Nile, is where Grand Prix is headed when her racing days are done.

"My goal is to have five to 10 broodmares, all ultimately coming out of my racing program. I'm running all homebreds now. For a guy that got in late and had to buy everything, in a few short years I've moved to vertically integrating and running my own horses."

McEntee had nothing but praise for the owner. "Hank is honestly one of the kindest and respectable men I know. He is my friend, mentor at times and truly someone very dear to my heart. Together we have propelled each other and I shall be eternally grateful."

PENNSYLVANIA EQUINE INDUSTRY STUDY RELEASED

Delaware Valley University released a new study on Oct. 10 on the equine industry's economic impact in Southeastern Pennsylvania. It has been determined that the equine industry in that region has a \$670 million economic impact.

The equine industry spends \$546 million on goods, services, wages, and salaries in Southeastern Pennsylvania. The impact of this spending generates \$670 million to regional GDP, supports more than 6,550 jobs and generates \$58 million in tax revenue. The sector also provides almost \$160 million in annual payroll and plays a vital role in maintaining open spaces and agricultural production.

John Urbanchuk, chair of agribusiness at DelVal, directed the study. Dr. Sarah Young, chair of the DelVal animal science department; Cory Kieschnick, chair of the DelVal equine science and management department; and Christine Seel; co-chair of the Del-Val business and information management department worked with Urbanchuk on the study.

The study was commissioned by the Chester-Delaware County Farm Bureau. The region in the study consists of: Berks, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Lancaster, Lebanon, Montgomery, Philadelphia, Schuylkill and York counties. Southeastern Pennsylvania is home to two leading equine counties in Pennsylvania, Lancaster, and Chester.

The last study of the equine industry in Pennsylvania was conducted and published by Penn State in 2003 and examined the entire Commonwealth. The information from the study will be provided to policymakers, local government officials, equine industry professionals, and the general public.

Fast Facts about the Equine Industry's Economic Impact in the Region:

- The equine industry pumps \$386 million in direct spending on goods and services into the Southeastern Pennsylvania economy.
- The industry provides an annual payroll of almost \$160
 million
- The equine sector supports 6,550 jobs in all sectors of the regional economy
- Taxpayers benefit from \$58 million in tax revenue generated by equine activities.

THE JOCKEY CLUB RELEASES 2017 REPORT OF MARES BRED STATISTICS

The Report of Mares Bred (RMB) statistics for the 2017 breeding season released by The Jockey Club show a decline nationally from numbers reported in 2016. But Pennsylvania numbers were up 15.13 percent compared to 2016.

Based on RMBs received through Oct. 17, 2017, The Jockey Club reports that 1,342 stallions covered 31,863 mares in North America during 2017. In Pennsylvania, the number of stallions reported standing decreased by 12.20 percent (36 in

2017 compared to 41 in 2016), but the number of mares bred rose to 563, after 489 were bred the previous year.

Nationally, the number of stallions declined 5.7 percent from the 1,423 reported at this time in 2016, and the number of mares bred decreased 5.6 percent from the 33,746 reported last year. Based upon historical reporting trends, The Jockey Club estimates an

additional 2,000 to 3,000 mares will be reported as bred during the 2017 breeding season.

Of the 36 stallions standing in Pennsylvania, a third covered more than 10 mares in their book.

Northview PA's first-year stallion Uncle Lino was the busiest stallion in the Mid-Atlantic region, the son of Uncle Mo covering 103 mares. Others with 20 or more mares were: the region's leading sire Jump Start (72) and fourthyear stallion El Padrino (55), both standing at Northview PA: Red Vine (53, Xanthus

Farms), Peace and Justice (38, Diamond B), Bullsbay (36, Northview PA), Uptowncharlybrown (23, Diamond B), Lord Shanakill (20, Pin Oak Lane) and Xixixi (20, Xanthus Farms).

SIX-FIGURE PA-BRED YEARLINGS AT FALL SALES

Three PA-bred yearlings sold for \$100,000 at Fasig-Tipton yearling sales this fall, one at the Midlantic Fall Yearlings sale on Oct. 3 in Timonium, and two at the Kentucky sale held from Oct. 23 through Oct. 26 in Lexington.

A colt by Shackleford out of stakes winner Ms. Cruisen', by Candy Ride (Arg), was purchased from the Darby Dan Farm consignment at the Timonium sale by Pick View LLC. Bred by Matthew T. Groff, the chestnut colt, a foal of March 12, is the first foal for his dam, a winner of Parx's Cornucopia Stakes and \$245,924. The family includes champion grass mare and Breeders' Cup turf-G1 winner Miss Alleged and stakes-winning sire Bold Josh.

Tiznow offspring were the top-priced Pennsylvania-breds in Kentucky. The first to sell was a half-sister to current 2-year-old stakes performer Afterburner. Bred by Blackstone Farm LLC, the Tiznow filly is out of the winning Exchange Rate mare Brilliancy, a full sister to stakes winner Cream Only and half-sister to graded stakes winners Electrify (an earner of \$666,890) and Rothko (Grade 1-placed earner of \$292,136) as well as stakes-placed Kinsey, dam of 2017 multiple stakes winner Firsthand Report. Consigned by Taylor Made Sales Agency Agent XLVI, E J Stable made the purchase.

Walnut Green, agent for breeders Smart Angle LLP & C Biscuit Racing, sold the \$100,000 Tiznow colt to Tom Bush. The January foal is out of Smart Strike's daughter Monday Valentine, a half-sister to Grade 1-winning millionaire sprinter Idiot Proof.

OBITUARY: ROBERT A. SZEYLLER

Robert A. "Bob" Szeyller, of Bellefonte, Pa., died on Oct. 10, at Mount Nittany Medical Center. The longtime PHBA board of director was 79.


A graduate from the Pennsylvania State University with a B. S. Degree in Business Management, Mr. Szeyller held an M. S. degree in Financial Services from the American College and received his Chartered Life Underwriter (CLU) & Chartered Financial Consultant

(CFC) designations. He was a partner and co-founder of PFG Capital Corporation and was the retired Chairman Emeritus and founder of ARIS Corporation of America, an investment management firm. He also was the retired founder of Pennsylvania Financial Group, headquartered in State College, Pa., one of the largest privately owned insurance and securities marketing firms. Bob served on many corporate and non-profit boards. He was also with the 112 PA Air National Guard Unit and was activated and sent to Germany during the Berlin crisis.

Bob's life-long passion for horses began with riding and showing which evolved into racing. Always a competitor, Bob was an owner, trainer and breeder of Thoroughbreds since 1986. He served on the board of directors for the Pennsylvania Horse Breeders Association (from 1994 through 2007) as well as the Breeders' Cup. Among his best runners was Sly Ole Buck, a PA-bred he purchased and owned and trained through a career that included a win in the 2000 Lyman Sprint Championship Stakes at Philadelphia Park and five stakes placings; and Andrew L, a stakes-placed runner of \$515,830 Szeyller bred and raced for the majority of his career. Szeyller runners included those named for the area in which he lived, such as winners Duke of Bellefonte

and Nittany Fan.

Szeyller is survived by his wife of 57 years, the former Mary Radovic, as well as his children, Laurie Sneve and her husband, Jerry B., of Carlsbad, Calif., and Lisa Hauser and her husband, Eric H., of Bermuda Dunes, Calif.; and two grandchildren, Lainey and Hailey Hauser. New Broodmare Domicile Requirements & Registration Eligibility for 2018 Foals

We are pleased to announce that the Registration Eligibility and Broodmare Domicile requirements for the 2018 crop of foals have changed. Mares bred to registered PA-Sires are up substantially this year, according to our preliminary count, and continuing that trend will move us to an increase in registered foals, which is our priority.

- The dam of the foal resided continuously in Pennsylvania since **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception through foaling. Mares not being bred back will fall under this category. *(Formerly November 1.)*
- The dam of the foal was purchased at a public sale after **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception and brought into Pennsylvania within 14 days of the date of purchase and remained continuously through foaling. During the year of foaling, the foal or its dam spent at least ninety (90) days in the state. *(Formerly November 1.)*

• The dam of the foal arrived after **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception, foaled in Pennsylvania and was bred back to a registered PA stallion standing in Pennsylvania and the dam of the foal resided SIXTY (60) consecutive days during which foaling occurred. *(Formerly November 1 and 90 days.)*

PA-Bred Stakes Recap: Parx Racing

The 2017 PA-Bred stakes schedule has a total of 22 stakes, each worth \$100,000. Also continuing is the 25% bonus for all PA-Sired PA-Bred horses finishing first through third in all restricted stakes, which brings the total combined purses to \$2.75 million.

Plum Pretty Stakes

Power of Snunner got back to her winning ways with an all-out effort in Parx Racing's Plum Pretty Stakes on Oct. 7, getting up in the final strides to win by a head over Trace of Grace as the favorite in the field of five. It was 14 lengths back to third-place finisher Mama Jones.

Bred and owned by James Courtney, Power of Snunner, a 7-year-old daughter of Castle Rock Farm stallion Power by Far, got her second stakes win of the year, and boosted her 2017 earnings to \$221,250 from nine starts, with two wins, two seconds and a third. She also won the Obeah Stakes at Delaware Park in June.

A stakes winner earlier in her career in the 2015 Foxy J. G. Stakes, she has 33 starts lifetime, with nine wins, 15 seconds and three thirds, for a total bankroll of \$562,310.

Making a dozen starts exclusively in stakes company since July 2015, and never finishing worse than fourth, Power of Snunner recorded seconds in the Grade 3 Doubledogdare Stakes at Keeneland and Grade 3 Bayakoa Stakes at Oaklawn Park, both this year, as well as the Northern Fling, Lady's Secret and Pan Zareta and a third in the Dr. Teresa Garofalo Memorial. She has a total of a dozen stakes wins or placings in her career.

Out of the winning Yarrow Brae mare Snunner, Power of Snunner is a half-sister to stakes winner Spring Dance, an earner of \$199,841 and winner of the 2012 Dr. Teresa Garofalo Memorial Stakes, and a full sister to \$210,927-earner Powerful Sun.

Blasts From The Past

TREIZIEME

Chestnut filly, 1981, The Minstrel—Belle Pensee, by *Ribot. Bred by Kiltinan Farms Inc. and George Strawbridge Jr.; owned by Oak Cliff Stable; trained by Maurice Zilber and John Gosden.

The first Breeders' Cup delivered as expected—a celebration of international racing on U.S. shores, attracting runners from all over the world to compete on racing's richest day. Two PA-bred runners competed on the inaugural card at Hollywood Park on Nov. 10, 1984—juvenile filly Bessarabian and 3-year-old filly Treizieme, who tackled males and older runners in the Turf.

Treizieme was French-based, but born at Marshall Jenney's Derry Meeting Farm when George Strawbridge

teamed up with Ogden White of Kiltinan Farms in 1980 to breed the young *Ribot mare Belle Pensee to Windfields Farm stallion The Minstrel. The next spring, Belle Pensee delivered a pretty chestnut filly in Pennsylvania.


Belle Pensee's daughter was offered as a weanling at the Keeneland November sale and sold for \$500,000, which equaled the North Ameri-

can record for a public auction sales weanling until the record was surpassed by \$25,000 later in the sale. Oak Cliff Breeders made the purchase, named the filly Treizieme, campaigned her for four seasons, and then sold her as a broodmare prospect in 1987 for \$1.75 million.

Treizieme was always a high achiever. Sent to legendary French trainer Maurice Zilber, she broke her maiden at first asking in the fall of 1983. She followed with a win in early October in France's most important 2-year-old race, the Grand Criterium-G1 at Longchamp. She was the only filly in the field, and the first in 17 years to win. Her connections were so inspired by the results, it was reported that she would be sent back to the U.S. to contest the Hollywood Futurity-G1 that December. The long-term goal was to participate in the Breeders' Cup the following year.

Ranked as the second highweighted filly on French Free Handicap, she didn't make the overseas trip at 2, instead staying in France to launch her 3-year-old campaign. She remained undefeated when taking her first two starts of the year—the Group 3 Prix de la Grotte and Group 3 Prix de Psyche—before finishing third in both the Prix de la Nonette-G3 and Prix Vermeille-G1, the latter against older mares.

The trip to the U.S. finally took place in October when she lined up for the Grade 1 Washington, D.C., International at Laurel, but finished off the board as the



favorite. She didn't fare much better in Santa Anita's Oak Tree Invitational-G1 next out, yet remained on target for the Breeders' Cup. The 1½mile Turf proved too tough a task as Treizieme finished last in the field of 11 after racing wide throughout from her outside post, and she returned to France.

A winner of the Prix de la Pepiniere at 4, and third in that year's Group 1

Grand Prix de Saint-Cloud, Treizieme was back in the states for good in 1986. Trained by John Gosden, she made four starts that year, three in graded stakes—her best finish a second in Hollywood Park's Beverly Hills Handicap-G2—before concluding her career with a win in the Canterbury Turf Classic Handicap in which she established the 1%-mile course record of 2:12%.

Treizieme was purchased at the 1987 Keeneland January sale by Tom Tatham, a partner in Oak Cliff Stables, and bred to Kentucky's elite stallions – Devil's Bag, Halo, Alydar, Alysheba, Easy Goer, Forty Niner and Seattle Slew. Six of her eight foals started, and all won, including stakes winner Oakmont (by Alydar) and stakes-placed Shadha (by Devil's Bag), her first foal who sold for \$700,000 at the Keeneland July sale of 1989. Treizieme's final foal was the 1996 Seattle Slew colt Snoqualmie.
