Senior Senator is one tough competitor

Senior Senator was like a square peg trying to fit into a round hole when it came to racing on the flat, unable to win even lower-level claiming races at Penn National Race Course.

But given time, and with the patience of his owners, Irvin L. "Skip" Crawford and his wife, Vicki, and trainer Joe Davies and his wife, Blythe Miller, the Pennsylvania-bred gelding showed that his true talent was competing over fences, where he fit into that round hole just perfectly.

The 8-year-old son of Domestic Dispute, bred by Charles C.D. McGill, captured his second Maryland Hunt Cup April 28, a grueling timber race in Glyndon at four miles over towering fences, and was

contested on turf made sodden from rain the day before. He captured the 2016 race, but fell in last year's renewal and suffered a fractured neck. Sidelined for months, and continuing his comeback after surgery that saved his life, the gelding led wire-to-wire with amateur jockey Eric Poretz aboard, recording a gutty fivelength victory. The Hunt Cup, considered one of the nation's premier steeplechase races, followed on the heels of his triumph in the Grand National April 21 in Butler.

The story of how Senior Senator was transformed from a rogue who did not like the atmosphere of the racetrack, or being confined to a stall for most of the day, into a Maryland Hunt Cup winner even attracted the attention of *60 Minutes*, who featured him as part of a segment on steeplechase racing in April of 2017.

Davies and Miller, both former steeplechase riders and Hunt Cup winners, went to Penn National the night of May 11, 2013, and when they saw Senior Senator, they thought his 17.2-hand frame would do well in hunt races and decided to claim him for \$7,500. But when they watched how the big bay behaved, they had second thoughts. Before the race, he dropped his jockey and ran loose for a bit, and afterwards his trainer Flint Stites told the couple that he'd "never trained a crazier horse" as a warning so that they wouldn't get hurt. Stites even called the gelding's owner McGill to ask if he wanted to buy the horse back, but he declined. And so Senior Senator began his new life with Davies and Miller.

"I knew Joe [Davies] and Blythe [Miller] were good people, and because Senior Sen-

ator wasn't happy and his future wasn't very bright, I was perfectly happy that he went home with them," recalled McGill.

Back at Davies' farm in Maryland, the couple realized they had quite a project on their hands.

"At first, we couldn't get a bridle or tack on him," said Davies. "He's not mean, he's just a big horse and very exuberant. He's done a lot of crazy things. The first time we took him to breeze at Laurel Park, he jumped over the partition in the trailer, and we had a whole crew that came to free him with the jaws of life, with a veterinarian telling us he should be put down because he'd sliced a leg open coming over the partition. He'd jump the fence of every field we'd put him in. So many

people said we were wasting our time, but he seemed like he might have a lot of talent and potential. It was a combination of stupidness on our part and genius on his part that made it all work.

"He just wants to run 30 miles an hour and jump over the biggest fences," he said.

Paired with Poretz, Senior Senator rewarded his owners and trainer with a victory in the 2016 Hunt Cup. In the 2017 renewal, however, he fell at the third fence, and was sent to Dr. Dean Richardson at the University of Pennsylvania's New Bolton Center for surgery.

"He has a small plate in his neck to fuse the vertebrae," said Davies. "The people at New Bolton made no promises about him being able to jump again, but they said even if he was going to be a turnout, he deserved a chance. They'd had success with one show horse returning to competition before with similar surgery."

Senior Senator proved to be a great patient, and gradually went from months of being hand-walked to light exercise on a Eurociser. Davies said that not wearing shoes for eight months helped his bad feet grow and heal. And when he returned to competition in April after a year on the sidelines, he first won the Grand National, followed by the Hunt Cup.

"The Crawfords had every reason to doubt our faith in this horse," said Davies. "They kept a stiff upper lip the whole time. And Eric [Poretz] has been a huge part of this story. None of the professional jockeys would ride him. Eric and Senior Senator have a special rapport. They made each other. Eric is a dedicated amateur rider who does this for the love of the sport."

"The Hunt Cup is the race everybody wants to win," said Skip Crawford. "It was special to win this race with Senior Senator two years ago, but, under the circumstances, it's even better this time."Foaled at Dr. William Solomon's Pin Oak Lane Farm in New Freedom, Pa., Senior Senator

was raised at breeder McGill's High Hope Farm in Upperco, Md., only a few miles away from the Hunt Cup course.

"I remember him vividly as a yearling," recalled McGill, a lawyer. "He had a very impressive stature, and he stood out. I've raised and handled many horses, and we've had some miscreants come through here, but he wasn't one of them. He was a really nice horse with no problems. He wasn't a problem when he was being broken, either. But the way Flint [Stites] sees it, it was something about all the noise and activity and confinement at the racetrack that he wanted no part of. In that environment, he became a problem."

McGill said that he and his wife have gotten much pleasure from Senior Senator's success in his new career.

"We couldn't be happier," said McGill. "It's been a win-win situation for the horse and for the people who own and care for him now."

Since making his first start over timber in October 2014, the gelding has made 10 starts, winning five, been second in three others, and has earned nearly \$200,000.

In addition to Senior Senator, his dam Queen Kennelot (by Awesome Again) produced the stakes-placed Pennsylvania-bred Jump Start gelding Johnny Jump Up in 2011, an earner of \$242,875. She has a 2-yearold colt by Smarty Jones that McGill named Junior Senator, who is doing well training with Stites. The mare had a colt by Golden Lad this spring, and is in foal to Madefromlucky.

As for Senior Senator, Davies said he's currently being ridden three to four days a week, doing light exercise.

"We might do some fox hunting with him in the fall and some hunter trials, but he won't run again until next year, we run him in the spring only," he said.

Midnight Poker a hot hand for new breeders

"He doesn't look like Halo Hollie, but he is a beautiful horse," said

Dr. Bucky. "John [Servis] didn't know what to think of him before his

first start, because he didn't show much in the morning, so we decided

to put him in a maiden claimer. He won that first race [Sept. 5, 2017,

at Parx] and then we brought him back in a starter allowance [Dec. 4],

which he won pretty impressively. After he won, John said, 'this horse

might be okay,' and after a three-month break we entered him in an

open allowance at Parx [March 5] at 7 furlongs, which he won by nearly

6 lengths, even though Kendrick Carmouche said he was getting a little

For many years, Dr. Lou Bucky has been a member of the partnership group Main Line Racing Stable, which has raced many stakes winners under the guidance of trainer John Servis.

But it wasn't until April 21 that Dr. Bucky could add the title of "stakes-winning breeder" to his already impressive resume. Dr. Bucky, one of the country's top doctors for cosmetic and reconstructive surgery, whose clinical work has been featured on national television programs like Good Morning America, Healthwatch and CNN, is the breeder of Midnight Poker, an undefeated son of Smarty Jones trained by Servis and owned by Main Line Racing Stable. Midnight Poker's most re-

cent triumph came in the \$85,000 Robert Hilton Memorial Stakes at Hollywood Casino at Charles Town Races April 21.

Foaled in Pennsylvania at Lojeski Farm in Emmaus, Midnight Poker has thus far proven to be a very nice surprise, winning all four of his lifetime starts and climbing from the maiden-claiming ranks to that of stakes competition.

The story of Midnight Poker began when Main Line Racing Stable raced his dam, Halo Hollie, a daughter of Halo's Image, from 2010 until early 2012.

"Halo Hollie was a fa-

vorite of mine," said Dr. Bucky. "She had a good career with us, and at one point she had won three races in a row. She was versatile and a good athlete—she could go short or long, and run on dirt or turf."

"She was big and beautiful," recalled Servis. "And every time you led her over there, she ran her heart out."

In February 2012 at Parx Racing, Halo Hollie was claimed away from Main Line Racing Stable and then spent the next two years competing throughout the mid-Atlantic region, changing hands several times.

"I kept my eye on her, and offered to buy her back as a broodmare," recalled Dr. Bucky. "I got her for \$2,500 [in August 2013] and then she was retired."

Halo Hollie headed to the breeding shed with a record of 35 starts, 11 wins, and nearly \$260,000 in earnings. The first stallion she was bred to was Smarty Jones, whom Servis nearly won the Triple Crown with in 2004, and in 2015 she foaled Midnight Poker.

tired after the race."

Servis thought Midnight Poker might do well against stakes competition, so he picked out the Robert Hilton Memorial for 3-year-olds at 7 furlongs, which shared the card with the \$1.15 million Charles Town Classic-G2.

With one of the nation's top jockeys, Irad Ortiz Jr., aboard, the gelding seized the lead right out of the gate and established nearly a 2-length advantage through the first half-mile while basically being under a hand ride. He maintained that lead

around the far turn, and then Ortiz went to the stick, urging him along to turn back the challenge of Threes Over Deuces, who had been steadied early but was rallying strongly under Arnaldo Bocachica. Midnight Poker, however, had plenty left, and began to increase his lead to the wire, winning by 1¾ lengths in 1:25.14 as the betting favorite.

"That was a very impressive race, and he earned a big speed figure, too," said Dr. Bucky. "It was especially exciting because he was the first stakes winner I've bred."

"Midnight Poker isn't a very big horse, and he was a real handful when he was being broken," said Servis. "When I got him, he didn't show much until he ran, so I wasn't real confident going into his first race. He's had a different rider in every one of his races, and every rider loves him."

New Broodmare Domicile Requirements & Registration Eligibility for 2018 Foals

We are pleased to announce that the Registration Eligibility and Broodmare Domicile requirements for the 2018 crop of foals have changed. Mares bred to registered PA-Sires are up substantially this year, according to our preliminary count, and continuing that trend will move us to an increase in registered foals, which is our priority.

- The dam of the foal resided continuously in Pennsylvania since **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception through foaling. Mares not being bred back will fall under this category. *(Formerly November 1.)*
- The dam of the foal was purchased at a public sale after **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception and brought into Pennsylvania within 14 days of the date of purchase and remained continuously through foaling. During the year of foaling, the foal or its dam spent at least ninety (90) days in the state. *(Formerly November 1.)*

• The dam of the foal arrived after **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception, foaled in Pennsylvania and was bred back to a registered PA stallion standing in Pennsylvania and the dam of the foal resided SIXTY (60) consecutive days during which foaling occurred. *(Formerly November 1 and 90 days.)*

PAGE MCKENNEY EARLY LEADER OF PHBA MATCH SERIES BONUS

Page McKenney, the 2015 PA-Bred Horse of the Year and champion older male of 2016, had made 55 career starts, but never once at Monmouth Park. In his seaside track debut on May 26, Adam Staple and Jalin Stable's 8-year-old gelding captured the Grade 3 Salvator Mile, his 15th career stakes victory, and his first in the revived MATCH Series. The win in the \$100,000 stakes pushed

his lifetime bankroll to \$1,870,940 and gave him 10 points and the lead for the MATCH Series 3-Year-Old & Up Long – Dirt Division.

"I was always afraid to try him at Monmouth because it's always speed-holding," said his trainer Mary Eppler to MATCH officials. "Now, we'll have to look at the other races in the MATCH Series for him."

The Pennsylvania Horse Breeders Association has joined other breeders' organizations in the region to offer \$10,000 in bonuses to state-bred MATCH Series participants, with the breeder of the top point-earning PA-Bred male and female at

the end of the series each receiving a \$5,000 bonus. The decision by the organizations to join the series completes the effort to get all of the region's stakeholders to participate and enjoy the benefits of the championship competition.

The MATCH Series is the racing industry's first and only regional championship competition. Horses compete in stakes in five

different divisions throughout the region from mid-May through mid-September, with the horses competing for just under \$3 million in purses and earning points for their order of finish.

The owners and trainers of the series horses will compete for \$450,000 in bonuses, with bonuses being paid for the winners of each division and the overall championship. The first, second and

third-place owners, respectively, in each division will earn \$20,000, \$15,000, and \$10,000. The top three earning trainers will earn \$15,000, \$10,000 and \$5,000, respectively. The MATCH Series overall top earning owner will win \$50,000, while the top earning trainer will earn \$25,000.

Three of the 3-Year-Old & Up Long – Dirt Division stakes are run at Monmouth (next up is the Philip H. Iselin on June 30). The division concludes with the Salvatore M. Debunda President's Cup at Parx on Aug. 25 and the Presque Isle Mile at Pr-

esque Isle Downs on Sept. 16.

Page McKenney, bred by Dr. James Bryant and Linda Davis, has won 22 times and been second or third in another 19 during his seven-year career. He is among the finalists - for older male and male sprinter - for the 2017 Iroquois Awards, which will be presented June 8 at The Hotel Hershey.

FOUR PA-BREDS BRING SIX-FIGURES AT FASIG-TIPTON MIDLANTIC MAY 2-YEAR-OLD SALE

Led by a \$210,000 Friesan Fire colt bred by Vicky Schowe and Beasie Patterson, 23 PA-Breds sold at the two-day Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Two-Year-Olds in Training sale held May 21 and 22 at the sales grounds in Timonium, Md. The PA-Breds grossed \$1,352,000,

for an average of \$58,783.

Grassroots Training & Sales LLC consigned the Friesan Fire colt after purchasing him for \$20,000 at last fall's Fasig-Tipton Midlantic yearling sale. The colt worked an eighth-mile in :10 2/5, two ticks off the fastest time for the sale, and Gary Young made the purchase for Mike Dubb. He is the third foal of racing age for Forestry's winning daughter Avani Force,

whose other two foals are winners. Second dam Avani (by Gulch) is a half-sister to three stakes winners including graded winner Jade Flush.

The final 2-year-old to sell in the sale, Hip 597, was a PA-Bred colt by Take Charge Indy out of Tweet, by Medaglia d'Oro. Offered by Classic Bloodstock, Agent II, he sold to Linda Rice, Agent, for

Four Bucks Racing, the gelding's official breeder, is comprised of the entire Bucky family-daughters Alexandra and Caroline, wife Elizabeth, and Lou.

"This horse keeps proving us wrong, every step he takes," said Dr. Bucky, referring to Midnight Poker's road to an unbeaten record, during which he's amassed earnings of \$144,570. "His next start will likely be in the \$100,000 Danzig Stakes [for Pennsylvania-bred 3-year-olds at 6 furlongs] at Penn National on June 2."

Dr. Bucky said that Halo Hollie foaled a filly by Overanalyze April 28, and is scheduled

to be bred back to Mizzen Mast. Halo Hollie has a 2-year-old colt by Jump Start named Defibrillator that will be trained by Servis, and an Afleet Alex yearling filly. Dr. Bucky also has an interest in two other Pennsylvania-based broodmares with Main Line Racing Stable–Whistling Straits, a winning Scat Daddy mare who had a Tapizar filly in early April, and Bai Bai Baby, a winning Unbridled's Song mare who had a colt by Violence in March.

Dr. Bucky said he became a horse owner through his golf outings with the renowned professional Gary Player; Player has received worldwide acclaim for breeding top Thorough-

\$200,000. Bred by Equivine Farm LLC, the bay born May 4 sold as a yearling last October at the Maryland sale for \$50,000. He also clocked an eighth-mile in :10 2/5.

Speedway Stable bid \$180,000 to take home an Into Mischief

filly bred by James R. McGlinn. A May 10 foal, she is out of Street Singer, by Street Cry (Ire), also the dam of PA-Bred winners Street Invader (\$215,008), Awesome Singer (\$188,590) and current 3-year-old Our Philly Girl, from the family of graded winner and \$761,654-earner Irish Warrior. She worked one of the fastest times of the sale, getting an eighth mile in :10 1/5.

Realizing a final bid of \$135,000 from trainer Joe Sharp, Agent, was an Alternation filly out of And Stay Out, by Exchange Rate, bred by Three Lyons Racing LLC. Sold through the Bobby Dodd consignment, the filly who worked in :10 2/5 is the first foal for her dam, a half-sister to graded stakes winner Sorryaboutnothing. She initially sold for \$75,000 at the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky October yearling sale.

breds, including Grade 1 Sword Dancer Invitational winner Broadway Flyer, at his Gary Player Stud Farm in South Africa, and he encouraged Dr. Bucky to get involved in the sport.

"My first horse was co-owned with Gary Player in Florida; eventually I met John [Servis] and then other friends got together and formed Main Line Racing Stable," he said. "These are a group of guys who love racing and just love having a good time. They understand the business and take their losses well."

Thus far, Midnight Poker has given the Main Line partners and Four Bucks Racing plenty to cheer about."
