2018 PA Day At the Races: a million-dollar celebration

The 18th annual Pennsylvania's Day at the Races, held Saturday, Sept. 1 at Parx Racing, proved to be a great day of PA-Bred racing, featuring \$1 million in purses for the first time in the event's history. One-hundred PA-Breds showcased their talents as they battled down the stretch in the card's 11 races, five stakes.

The 18th annual Pennsylvania's Day at the Races, held Saturday, Sept. 1 at Parx Racing,



proved to be a great day of PA-Bred racing, featuring \$1 million in purses for the first time in the event's history. One-hundred PA-Breds showcased their talents as they battled down the stretch in the card's 11 races, five stakes.

The Pennsylvania Horse Breeders Association treated Pennsylvania breeders and their guests, owners and trainers to a buffet lunch, complete with a private third-floor view of the track. Raffle prizes included PHBA bags full of PA-Bred swag; a hand-painted cornhole game set, courtesy of J & M Custom Cornhole; and baskets loaded with horse-related items donated by the PTHA, Turning for Home and the Daily Racing Form. The stakes-winning owners received a leather PHBA overnight bag, and winning stakes trainers were presented a cooler with the name of the stakes race em-

broidered on it for the winning PA-Bred, presented in the winner's circle. All stakes participants received a Patagonia backpack filled with PHBA goodies. All breeders and their guests who attended the luncheon received a PHBA tote bag filled with a blanket, hat and coffee mug.

Kicking off the day's stakes action was the Dr. Teresa Garofalo Memorial, for fillies and mares, 3 and up. Zipper's Hero (left), a 5-year-old mare bred by Peter Giangliulo by Castle Rock Farm stallion Partner's Hero, broke a step slower than the rest of the field but spurted to a clear lead after the opening quarter. Leading by 2½ lengths entering the far turn, the even-money favorite remained in control down the stretch to defeat Risque's Diamond by 3 lengths.

It proved to be the most emotional race of the day. Dr. Garofalo was the treasurer of the PHBA board before she passed away in 2010 from acute myeloid leukemia. Her equine practice in West Chester, Smokey's Run Farm, focused on equine reproduction, and the stakes in her name is a special one to the PHBA. Dr. Garofalo's mother, Vera Vann-Wilson, and brother, Ted Vanderlaan, were in attendance to present the winning trophy.

"It's such an honor to be here, and I'm grateful to you all for continuing the race in her memory," Ted Vanderlaan expressed to PHBA staff in the winner's circle. "She would love this." The emotion didn't stop there. With the win, trainer Eddie Coletti Jr. surpassed \$1 million in earnings for the year, a career first. Zipper's Hero provided the first stakes victory for owner Mario Mangini, and Johan Rosado rode his first stakes winner for Coletti. It was the biggest winner's circle celebration of the day, and congratulations to all on their achievements!

The Mrs. Penny Stakes was moved to the main track due to rainfall the



night before. Mr. and Mrs. Rodman Moorhead's homebred Rose Tree (top right) relished the change as she continued her incredible comeback year with a second stakes win in a row. Racing about 6 lengths behind the leaders on the backside, the 4-year-old Harlan's Holiday filly gained from there and took command on the far turn under regular rider Andrew Wolfson. Imply, winner of the Lyphard Stakes in June, chased after her through the stretch, but Rose Tree was able to hold her off and win by a neck. Trained by Hall of Famer Jonathan Sheppard, Rose Tree paid \$10 to win. "She held on gamely. She's a very nice filly," Sheppard told PTHA's Dani Gibson in a postrace interview.

The Banjo Picker Sprint Stakes was one of the most anticipated of the day, featuring last year's winner The Man (below), bred by Glenn E. Brok LLC. Despite another wardrobe malfunction this year, he proved to be the best again, in more ways than one. Untacked in the walking ring and retacked in the paddock stall with minutes to spare, the cool-under-pres-

sure 6-year-old trained by John Servis let everyone know that he really is "The Man." (Last year's malfunction came after the race, when he stood quietly in the winner's circle to have a shoe pulled that came partway off during the race.) With regular rider Jorge Vargas Jr. aboard, The Man broke well, dueled to the outside of his rivals and picked up a short lead off the turn. Midtowncharlybrown waited for room, and Pop Keenan made a late run but couldn't catch The Man. "We have won nine races out of 11. You cannot ask for a better horse," said Vargas postrace. This win was his seventh in eight tries at Parx.

The first of two upsets came in the Roanoke Stakes. Michael Jester's homebred Grasshoppin (above), off at 12-1, had a perfect trip under Edwin Rivera. The 7-year-old son of Cat

Thief trained by Claudio Gonzalez sat a length back of early leader Navy Commander down the backstretch and kept position after fractions of :23.62 and :47.41. He caught up to the leader around the final turn and pulled away in the stretch. Under urging by Rivera, he finished in 1:44.42, paying \$27. Grasshoppin finished third in the same race last year, and the connections were thrilled with the turn-about. "To be able to come back this year... he's not a young horse, and to run as hard as he does, it really shows you the great athlete he is," Jester said after the race.

The second upset came in the final stakes of the day, the Power by Far for fillies and mares, run for the first time on the PA Day At the Races card. Going 5 furlongs on the main track after the race came off the turf, She's Chubs (12-1) finished 1¼ lengths in front of Charlybrown's Rose, with favorite Pink Princess finishing third.

Bidding her time a couple of lengths behind early front-runner Captain Sam, She's Chubs (right) closed the gap after the first quarter-mile in :21.67. Under urging from Roberto Rosado, she surged ahead at the eighth pole and finished in :58:68.

Bred and owned by Rebecca and John Phillip Taylor and trained by Scott Lake, the

5-year-old daughter of retired Pennsylvania sire Albert the Great racked up her first stakes win in her stakes debut, paying \$26.40. "So happy for the owners," trainer Scott Lake told PTHA's Gibson. "We entered this horse 13 times, couldn't get a race to go. Last minute we decided we were going to run off the turf, and it was just tremendous."

We extend a sincere thank you to all of our members and guests who attended, as well as the board members and special guests who presented the gifts in each race. We're looking forward to a successful and productive 2019 breeding season and wish everyone the best of luck in the coming year.

PA 4-H horse education at Day At the Races

Pennsylvania Thoroughbred stakeholders are invested in educating others on the nuances of the equine industry. They are committed to the future of the industry and giving the next generation opportunities to learn about the possibilities a career working with these majestic animals has to offer.

At PA Day at the Races, held on Sept. 1 at Parx Racing, the Pennsylvania Horse Breeders Association (PHBA) showcased the best Pennsylvania Thoroughbreds to 4-H members from across the state. The event was coordinated by The State Horse Racing Commission and Pennsylvania Horse Racing Association (PHRA) in conjunction with Parx Racing, PHBA, Pennsylvania Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association (PTHA), Turning for Home, and other industry professionals. It included a tour of the backside of Parx, presentations from industry professionals, and the thrill of watching a live race named for 4-H. It concluded with a group picture taken with the winning jockey!

This was the first event of its kind at Parx Racing, and 4-H members responded with enthusiasm. Available spots were filled within 24 hours, and there was a waitlist for additional members interested in attending. The day began with an introduction and warm welcome from the Pennsylvania Horse Breeder Association's Executive Secretary Brian Sanfratello and PHRA Marketing Director Ashley Eisenbeil. The 4-H's Andrea Kocher was also on hand and expressed how special an opportunity like this was, "The youth have a chance to learn about the equine industry as well as the Thoroughbred aspect of the industry, so this is a very unique experience."

From there the attendees got to learn all about Parx Racing's Turning for Home from Program Administrator Danielle Montgomery. Turning for Home, Inc. is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization which has provided over 2,300 retired racehorses with a safe environment. The program, created by Executive Director Mike Ballezzi and the PTHA, has revolutionized the model for horseracing retirement. The PTHA had the foresight to recognize the need within the industry to care for retired racehorses who would have otherwise faced an uncertain future. The 4-H members learned that being part of the horseracing industry means caring for their

own, and ensuring the safety of these amazing animals before, during, and after their racing careers.

Kate DeMasi, first female Parx Hall of Fame trainer and member of the PTHA board, was on hand to educate 4-H youth on the organization and ways that the Pennsylvania horseracing industry is committed to caring for all of their Thoroughbreds. Dr. Tom Lurito provided an educational demonstration of how racehorses are microchipped and explained, "Eventually all of our horses will be microchipped, helping us to identify them in the paddock and coming in and out of the track". Not only does microchipping aid in tracking horses while at a race, but it also helps in cases of disease outbreaks by allowing veterinarians to quickly identify any horses that were in attendance at an event, thus allowing for quicker treatment.

Continuing on the theme of horse safety, farrier John Homa gave a demonstration and explanation on the need for properly-fitted horse-shoes. As he stated, a very popular expression on the track is "no feet, no horse. Similar to humans, if a horse can't walk well, then it can't run well. Therefore, it is crucial that horses are properly fitted for shoes to maintain their health and safety on the track."

Veterinarian Dr. Art Stitzer from Thoroughbred Veterinary Services was also on hand to give the 4-H members information on the role a vet plays in the safety and welfare of the Thoroughbreds throughout their lives.

After the morning events, the members were given an amazing opportunity to attend a presentation by Parx Hall of Fame jockey Tony Black, where he discussed his career and the equipment used by jockeys. Black's 48-year career includes 5,209 wins from an incredible 33,954 rides. Meeting this inspiring jockey was a highlight of the day as he is a legend in the horseracing industry with a highly celebrated career.

The event concluded with the 4-H members watching a thrilling live race and having a group photo taken with jockey Mychel J. Sanchez. After all the excitement of the day the members and their families were free to enjoy the rest of the race day at Parx Racing.

The goal of this event was to give an inside look at what happens on the backstretch and educate 4-H members to hopefully start growing the industry with future trainers, jockeys, veterinarians and owners. Judging by the success at PA Day At the Races, the future looks bright. ■

The 18th Pennsylvania's Day at the Races was held on Sept. 1 at Parx, where 450 breeders and guests, along with owners and trainers, saw amazing PA-Breds win coveted stakes titles and came together to celebrate our state-breds and breeding program. Congratulations to all the competitors!

We hope to continue the high spirits and good luck from Pennsylvania's Day at the Races into the fall months for broodmare domicile. In 2017, PA was the only one of the top-10 breeding states to show an increase in numbers of mares bred, and had a 19 percent increase in the number of mares bred to PA stallions. The program continues to grow. Don't miss out on being part of one of the top breeding programs in the country!

As a reminder, Broodmare Domicile Reports are due to the PHBA by Dec. 1. Broodmares must be in the state by Dec. 1, or within 14 days of a public sale. If you're breeding back to a registered PA stallion, you must complete the domicile report within 14 days of entering the state and reside continuously for 60 days through foaling. Please make note of these changes.

If you are unable to submit the form online, you may either print out a report and mail it in, or let us know and we'll mail a copy to you.

Pennsylvania Broodmare Domicile Requirements & Registration Eligibility for 2019 Foals

Please note the following broodmare domicile requirements for the 2019 crop of foals. Mares bred to registered PA-Sires are up again this year, according to our preliminary count, and continuing that trend will move us to an increase in registered foals, which is our priority.

- The dam of the foal resided continuously in Pennsylvania since **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception through foaling. Mares not being bred back will fall under this category.
- The dam of the foal was purchased at a public sale after **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception and brought into Pennsylvania within 14 days of the date of purchase and remained continuously through foaling. During the year of foaling, the foal or its dam spent at least ninety (90) days in the state.
- The dam of the foal arrived after **DECEMBER 1** of the year of conception, foaled in Pennsylvania and was bred back to a registered PA stallion standing in Pennsylvania and the dam of the foal resided **SIXTY (60)** consecutive days during which foaling occurred.

PAGE MCKENNEY AND RUSSELL JONES INDUCTED INTO PARX HALL OF FAME

The Parx Racing Hall of Fame Class of 2018 inductees were the most eclectic yet. The remarkable PA-Bred gelding Page McKenney joined trainer Richard Vega, and three individuals whose contribution to the state's industry are legendary, former Pennsylvania Governor Edward G. Rendell, veterinarian Dr. Patricia M. Hogan and master horseman Russell B. Jones Jr. The presentations were made at Parx on Sept. 15.

Page McKenney won 22 races from 58 starts and \$1.9 million. A son of former Pennsylvania stallion Eavesdropper bred by Dr. James E. Bryant and Linda P. Davis and foaled at Northview PA, Page McKenney didn't get his first win until his 13th start, and then became a win machine. His consistency was incredible—during a stretch of 31 races, 26 of them stakes, he finished in the top three 30 times.

"He was always different from every other foal we've had," said breeder and part-owner Bryant. "He was very curious and forward and smart... Plus, he was built like a tank. We kind of had good feelings, but who knew?"

A fan favorite, Page McKenney ran 10 times at Parx, recording seven wins, two seconds and a third, with victories in the Pa Derby Champion, Roanoke, Lyman and First Responder Stakes. During his career he competed at 11 different tracks.

"Watching him come down the stretch, head down and ears back, just pure grit and determination, man I'm going to miss it," Bryant said.

Russell B. Jones Jr. has literally done everything in Pennsylvania racing and everybody in the business knows him. "I've been a breeder in the state, for, it must be 40 some years," said Jones, who also sits on the Pennsylvania State Horse Racing Commission. "I was the head of the (Pennsylvania Horse Breeders Association) at one point. I was on a prior racing commission. My brother and I ran what was the biggest consignment agency (Walnut



Green) outside the state of Kentucky. Now, I'm retired and that has to be the biggest chapter of all."

Jones is "semi" retired, as he finds time to advise his good friend Phyllis Wyeth on matters involving her hot young sire Union Rags, winner of the 2012 Belmont Stakes. "It's been thrilling; it's been a lifetime experience," Jones said. "Great horse, great lady, may it last."

Governor Rendell was critical in getting expanded gaming enacted in Pennsylvania in 2004. "One of the many reasons I got behind expanded gaming is

because the horse racing industry is such a great job producer in the Commonwealth," said the governor.

Dr. Hogan has had a long career, but is most widely known for her treatment of the 2-year-old Smarty Jones when he suffered a severe head injury in a freak freak accident.

"Smarty Jones, he's my first love," Dr. Hogan said. "He was the neatest horse. The injury, of course, was very dramatic... Such a memorable animal. He really put me on the map for my career, just a fairy tale sort of ride that I had with the Chapmans, John Servis and that horse. It's just something I'll never forget, one of the best memories of my life."

Dr. Hogan has also been very instrumental in Parx's decade-old racehorse retirement program, the PTHA's Turning for Home, Inc.

Vega was just a teenager in 1980 when immigrate from his native Cuba when the U.S. border was open to Cuban residents during what was termed the Mariel Boat Lift. Vega was one of 125,000 who took up the offer.

He eventually made his way to a refugee camp in Fort Indiantown Gap, very close to Penn National. The excitement of the track lured him in. Vega worked his way to what was then called Keystone Racetrack in 1984 and never left. He has more than 1,000 wins since becoming a trainer in 1994 and his horses have won nearly \$17.5 million. ■

SIX-FIGURE PA-BRED YEARLINGS AT KEENELAND

A Pennsylvania-bred colt by Into Mischief out of Katherine'skadence was hotly pursued during the opening session of the Keeneland September Yearling sale, held Sept. 10 through Sept. 23 in Lexington, Ky. World powerhouse Godolphin made the final bid of \$875,000 to take the bay colt home.

Bred by C Biscuit Racing, Smart Angle LLP, CJB Holdings LLC Jeff Bozel, et al, the colt was purchased in utero when Walnut Green spent \$70,000 for Katherine'skadence at the 2016 Keeneland November Breeding Stock sale. At the time the Mr. Greeley mare had two foals of racing age, but neither had won (both are now winners). The family is deep, however, as Katherine'skadence is a half-sister to graded/group winners Drilling for Oil and White Crown, Grade 1-placed stakes winner Dr. Caton and group stakes-placed Wind Cheetah. Her half-sister, stakes-placed Confidante, is the dam of French Oaks-G1 winner Confidential Lady. The yearling colt's second dam, Won't She Tell, is a half-sister to Triple Crown winner Affirmed.

Twenty-four Pennsylvania-bred yearlings sold at this year's sale, grossing \$2,692,500 (for an average of \$112,188). Eight brought six-figures. Last year's leading breeder of Pennsylvania-breds, Blackstone Farm, accounted for five of them—three fillies, two by Quality Road and a Liam's Map, and colts by Honor Code and Super Saver.

PA-BRED IN THE RECORD BOOKS WITH HISTORIC LEATHERBURY WIN



Longtime Pennsylvania breeder Norman Lewis has had horses with Hall of Fame trainer King T. Leatherbury since the 1990s, and has had many winners, including homebred stakes winner Lightning Electric in 2013. So it should come as no surprise that a Lewis homebred would be tied to a historic Leatherbury milestone.

Lewis' 3-year-old filly Happy Lantern, a Pennsylvania-bred daughter of Any Given Saturday sent off at 16-1 odds, broke her maiden by a nose at Laurel Park on Sept. 22. The win was Leatherbury's 6,500th, and was a thrill for Lewis, a noted researcher and director of Washington State University's Institute of Biological Chemistry who didn't make the trip east for the race so missed out being part of the celebratory winner's circle photo.

Lewis wasn't sure that a win was in Happy Lantern's future.

Happy Lantern made her first start in mid-July and finished off the board in her first four races. "One thought in my mind," said Lewis, "was if she didn't do okay in that [September] race, I'd have to think of something else she could do, like show jumping or things like that." Now the filly will always be linked with Leatherbury in the record books.

Lewis, who boards his mares with Judy Barrett at Godstone Farm in Littlestown, also campaigns homebred Chateau de Vizille, who recorded Leatherbury's 6,499th win in July. Lewis currently has six horses with the 85-year-old trainer. ■

PENNSYLVANIA-BREDS TO SHOW OFF SECOND CAREERS AT THE 2018 THOROUGHBRED MAKEOVER

Horse registration for the 2018 Thoroughbred Makeover, presented by Thoroughbred Charities of America, closed on Aug. 1, and a total of 560 horses are currently registered to compete at the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington, Ky., from Oct. 4-7. Fifty-one were bred in Pennsylvania.

The Thoroughbred Makeover is a \$100,000 competition in which hundreds of trainers acquire a recently retired racehorse and prepare it over a period not to exceed 10 months for competition in one or two of 10 riding sports. Formats for competition are designed to test the quality and progress of each horse's training.

The Thoroughbred Makeover and National Symposium includes seminars, sponsor fair, horse sale, and the Thoroughbred Makeover finale, featuring the top three horses in each discipline and America's Most Wanted Thoroughbred. Competition is offered in barrel racing, competitive trails, dressage, eventing, field hunters, freestyle, polo, show hunter, show jumper, and working ranch.

Among the entrants are PA-Bred stakes winners Res Judicata and Morning Fire. Res Judicata, an 8-year-old son of Smarty Jones bred and raced by Pat Chapman, earned \$489,840 in 34 starts, and won nine times, including the Salvator Mile Stakes-G3. His last start came at Parx on June 24, 2017. Makeover trainer Tom Mansmann will compete with the flashy chestnut in Dressage and Ranch Work.

Morning Fire, bred by Cynthia Hipple and raced by Mercedes Stables LLC, earned \$264,638 and was a multiple stakes winner at 3. The now-5-year-old last raced Jan. 15, 2017, at Tampa Bay Downs. He's been entered in the disciplines of Dressage and Show Jumper with Cherie Gaebel.

RESCUED MARE IS TOP PENNSYLVANIA-BRED AT FAIR HILL THOROUGHBRED SHOW

Proud Chestnut was an unwanted mare with no takers, and seemingly no hope. Luckily she had a few guardian angels. Kim Nevitt would never have gotten the chestnut mare now named Pardoned if a friend hadn't first taken her. That friend urged Nevitt to check out the mare and, after six months, Nevitt finally did. And it was love in just one ride.

In the seven years since Proud Chestnut's last start, the winless daughter of Horse Chestnut (SAf) and the Saratoga Six mare In By Six has become a highly accomplished and much loved jumper. Her most recent competition resulted in the Fair Hill Thoroughbred Show's top PA-Bred award. The show, held Sept. 22 and 23 at the Fair Hill Natural Resources Center in Elkton, Md., offered hunter classes on Saturday, jumper classes on Sunday, as well as a competitive trail ride, and more than \$10,000 in prize money. The High Score PA-Bred Horse award was \$500. Pardoned competed in both jumper and hunter classes at Fair Hill.

Pardoned has earned numerous titles in her show career, including the 2014 USEF/Rood & Riddle Thoroughbred In Sport Award for Rookie Hunter, title of Pennsylvania's Most Wanted Thoroughbred in 2015, a first in the Low Adult Jumper Zone 2 HOTY Classic at the

2016 Devon Fall Classic, Champion, Low Adult Jumpers, at the 2017 World Equestrian Center, and Reserve Champion, High Adult Jumpers, at the 2018 World Equestrian Center. ■

STRAWBRIDGE HONORED WITH ROBERT N. CLAY CONSERVATION AWARD

The Equine Land Conservation Resource (ELCR) honored George Strawbridge Jr. with the 2018 Robert N. Clay Conservation Award at the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association (TOBA) National Awards dinner on Sept. 8 in Lexington, Ky.

The award, established in 2014 as a partnership between TOBA and ELCR to help increase awareness of the importance of land conservation to the Thoroughbred industry and to serve as an inspiration to others within the industry, is presented annually at the TOBA National Awards dinner.

Strawbridge, through his Augustin Stable, has been an important player in both flat and steeple chase racing and an industry leader. He has also been at the forefront in land conservation. Over the years Strawbridge has purchased several farms in Pennsylvania with the purpose of establishing a conservation easement on the land to preserve the beauty and function of the property. While some of the



properties were subsequently sold once an easement was in place, he retains ownership of over 900 acres of farmland in Pennsylvania, all of which are under conservation easement.

Strawbridge has been recognized as an ardent supporter of open space preservation for decades. His donation of multiple conservation easements to the Brandywine Conservancy, since 1993, has protected over 2,500 acres

of land in Lancaster and Chester Counties. Strawbridge was one of the original investors in the Buck and Doe Associates Limited Partnership that bought and conserved the King Ranch Property totaling over 5,000 acres.

The longtime Pennsylvania breeder is an active trustee of the Brandywine Conservancy and encourages landowners to conserve their properties so that future generations have a chance to appreciate the land before it is lost to development.

MORAN RECOGNIZED AS TOP 2017 PENNSYLVANIA BREEDER AT TOBA AWARDS

Elizabeth "Betty" Moran, breeder of the 2017 PA-Bred Horse of the Year, Eclipse Award-winning female sprinter Unique Bella, was honored as 2017 Pennsylvania breeder of the year by the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association (TOBA) at the National Awards dinner on Sept. 8 in Lexington, Ky.

Moran, whose Brushwood Stable yielded dozens of graded stakes winners over the decades, was also represented last year by group winning hurdle horse Lil Rockerfeller.

Unique Bella, recently retired at age 4, is one of the final Pennsylvania-bred Brushwood foals, as Moran's broodmare band had slowly been dispersed. Brushwood broodmares produced runners at the highest level at the Malvern farm, including millionaires Hard Spun and High Yield, and European champion Russian Rhythm.

OBITUARY: RONNIE HOUGHTON

The Pennsylvania breeding industry was dealt a major loss with the death of Ronald Bernard "Ronnie" Houghton on Sept. 23. The Christiana resident was 79.

Ronnie and wife Elizabeth "Betsy" Roosevelt Houghton, married for 56 years, owned and operated Sylmar Farms since 1970. Regularly among the state's leading breeders, the Houghtons bred the likes of Whistle Pig, who earned just shy of \$1 million, and graded stakes-winning PA-bred sprinter Banjo Picker. Among the horses foaled and raised on their Christiana farm was Pennsylvania-bred Horse of the Year Princess of Sylmar, a multi-millionaire and four-time Grade 1 winner for client Ed Stanco.

Born in Burlington, N.J., Houghton was the son of the late Thomas B. and Marie Carroll Houghton. An accomplished horseman, he rode in timber races in the early

years, and started training horses at the age of 19. He saddled the winners of more than 500 races before retiring from training in 2005. In addition to the horses, he enjoyed farming and raising cattle.

In addition to his wife Betsy, he is survived by four children, Bernie Houghton and wife Shannon from Christiana; Robin and husband Scott Perry, Christiana; Wendy and husband Travis Kinnamon, Kirkwood; Michael and wife Melissa Houghton, Kirkwood; 11 grandchildren, and a sister Doris Green of Kennett Square. He was predeceased by a brother, longtime Maryland breeder Eddie Houghton.

The September stakes schedule was packed full, highlighted by the 18th annual PA Day At the Races at Parx. The first juvenile stakes of the season offered rich opportunities at Presque Isle. Two of the last three stakes of the year are for the 2-year-olds.

The 2018 schedule has a total of 22 Pennsylvania-Bred restricted \$100,000 stakes races, worth a total of \$2.75 million in purses when calculating in the 25 percent bonus for all PA-Sired PA-Bred horses finishing first through third in all restricted stakes.

five and a half-length allowance score going five and a half furlongs at Presque Isle Downs in July.

The even-money favorite was Jump for Alex, an impressive front-running winner at Parx in his only start. The filly Amy Farah Fowler, making her fourth start, and second in a stakes (she was runnerup in Monmouth Park's Colleen Stakes in her prior outing), was sent off at 2.10-1. Pemaquid Sally was the longshot at 12-1.

Delta Express shot to the lead as Jump for Alex was slow at the break, giving up several lengths at the start. Amy Farah Fowler, game but erratic through the stretch, failed to threaten Delta Express, who came home a three and three-quarter-length winner. The final time for six furlongs over the Tapeta surface was 1:10.19.

Bred by Scott Bunker and Cynthia Bartkowski, Delta Express is out of Spunky Sparrow, a winning PA-Bred daughter of Attorney. The mare's third named foal, Delta Express is her second winner, and to date has earnings of \$110,340. Delta Express' yearling half-brother by Bullsbay is being offered at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Fall Yearling Sale in October. Spunky Sparrow missed to the cover of Weigelia for 2018, and has been bred back to the Pennsylvania stallion.

Mrs. Henry D. Paxson Memorial Stakes

Once again facing fillies, the consistent Amy Farah Fowler rewarded those who sent her off as favorite as she coasted home a one-length winner in the Mrs. Henry D. Paxson Memorial Stakes over Presque Isle's all-weather surface on Sept. 16. Her time for the six furlongs was 1:10.03.



In five starts, Amy Farah Fowler has never been worse than second, even when trying to sabotage her races. In her debut at Presque Isle in May, the filly ran off in the post parade, made it to the gate, and ran away to a five and a quarter-length maiden

victory. Next out, in a Presque Isle allowance in July, she ran off in the paddock, was given the okay to run after a vet check, and cruised to victory by nearly nine lengths.

A change in scenery when shipped to Monmouth in August for the Colleen Stakes barely helped, as she was reluctant to load, but facing her first stakes competition, she acquitted herself well to finish second.

Facing colts in the Mark McDermott Stakes, she once again proved hard on herself as she shied out sharply from a left-hand whip in upper stretch, then shot to the left when under right hand pressure. She ended up second.

There was no drama in the Paxson Memorial as Amy Farah Fowler broke well, pressed the pace and drove home. Owned and trained by Ron Potts, the Astrology filly bred by Blackstone Farm boosted her earnings to \$134,900 in five starts, a great return on Potts' \$8,500 investment at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Fall Yearling Sale.

Amy Farah Fowler is the first stakes winner for Run Cat Run, a stakes-placed daughter of Sir Cat. The mare produced a filly by Goldcents this April and was bred back to Madefromlucky. Her current yearling, a colt by Real Solution, is entered in the upcoming Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Fall Yearling Sale.

Alphabet Soup Stakes

Fast and Accurate hit the board in four straight stakes in 2018 leading up to the Alphabet Soup, run at Parx on the Pennsylvania Derby day card, Sept.

22. But he was seeking his first win in nearly a year—his last came in the Showing Up Stakes at the Gulfstream Park West meet in November 2017.

Turning in a very workmanlike performance in the Alphabet Soup, he recorded his fifth win, and fourth in a stakes, as the 9-10 favorite while running a mile and a sixteenth on the turf, defeating eight others.

A 4-year-old son of Hansen owned by Kendall E. Hansen (who also campaigned his sire), Fast and Accurate increased his earnings to \$514,547 from 18 starts. Winner of the Jack Cincinnati Casino Spiral Stakes-G3 at 3, the gray trained by Mike Maker finished third in last year's Crowd Pleaser Stakes at Parx, and this year ran second in the Leematt (at Presque Isle Downs) and Miesque's Approval Stakes (at Gulfstream Park), and was third in Gulfstream's Old Man Eloquent Stakes and Turfway Park's Kentucky Cup Classic.

Fast and Accurate was bred by John R. Penn and is one of seven winners from seven starters for the Green Dancer mare It's Heidi's Dance.

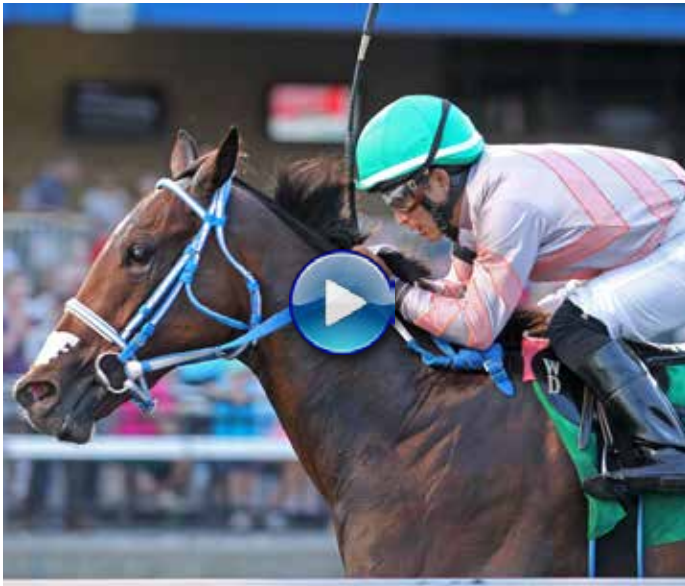
